Poetry for the Month

After the holidays by the Rev. Jan Twardowski Translation by Dcn. Jim Konicki

Holy days, public holy days and the days after Christmas None of which have been forgotten. I ate pastries, ate cakes, kissed my aunt's hand. I ate at the vigil, ate borsch and now I am a year older, after the herring and sardines in the empty place where the tree stood.

Święta, święta i po świętach nikt już o nich nie pamięta. Zjadłem placki, zjadłem babki, całowałem ciocię w łapki. Zjadłem wilię, zjadłem barszczyk i już jestem o rok starszy, po śledziku i sardynce w pustym miejscu po choince.

Our organizer and first Prime Bishop, Franciszek Hodur, was a strong advocate of education, the printed word, literature, and poetry. He saw these as the fruits of man's cooperation with God, and the means by which members of the Church could lift themselves up; the path to manifesting their dignity and acquiring economic, social, and cultural standing in their new country. My plan for 2009 is to present a year of poetry in recognition of Bishop Hodur's emphasis on education, human dignity, freedom, and our ultimate call to union with God.

In The Origin and Growth of the Polish National Catholic Church, the Rev. Stephen Włodarski, Ph.D. writes:

Bishop Francis Hodur was a great advocate of the printed word. He stimulated interest and engendered a desire in his followers to acquire learning. He organized special teaching courses and made available suitable reading material for them. He published the weekly "Straż" (Guard), and later, in 1923, published the weekly "Rola Boża" (God's Field). Other periodicals published by him were "Nowy Świat" (New World), "Trybuna" (Tribune), "Dziś i Jutro" (Today and Tomorrow), "Wiara i Zycie" (Faith and Life) and the quarterly "Polka" (Polish Woman). In addition to these, Bishop Leon Grochowski published in Chicago, the weekly "Przebudzenie" (The Awakening). A literary book store was opened at St. Stanislaus Parish, in Scranton, where classical literature and various brochures were made available. To encourage reading, cultural evening classes were regularly conducted. Bishop Hodur and other priests lectured on famous writers and scholars, and particularly those of Polish origin.

Whenever a famous Pole arrived in the United States, such as Ignacy Paderewski, Henryk Sienkiewicz, Tomasz [Zygmunt] Miłkowski, Wacław Sieroszewski, and others, they were invited to Scranton where they addressed the assembled and were entertained with poetry recitations and song.

Bishop Hodur greatly admired the poets Juliusz Słowacki and Maria Konopnicka.

History of Holy Name of Jesus Parish

Holy Name of Jesus Parish was originally established and founded as the Parish of St. Joseph in 1921. The Parish founders worked quickly to build a beautiful stone church on Raymond Street in Schenectady, equipping it with everything necessary for the worship of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. A rectory was acquired and the Parish founded a cemetery.

The founding of the Parish was not without its difficulties. Due to the flow of emigration through the area, and conflicts with Roman Catholic clergy, the Parish had difficulty attracting a permanent and stable group of Parishioners. With foresight, however, the National Church founders faithfully persevered in through these critical moments, including a fire which destroyed the interior of the original church. The founding members were willing to take on any job just to ensure victory for their good cause - a Church that is One, Holy, Catholic, Apostolic, and democratic.

By 1930 the Parish was on solid footing, having been rebuilt on Pearl Street in the Mount Pleasant area. The permanent pastor in 1930 was the Rev. Joseph Michalski, who for some time was the head of the National Church parish in Amsterdam, NY. It was said that in accordance with the principles of the National priesthood, Fr. Michalski carried the heart of his parishioners, and their experiences, within

himself.

Fr. Michalski worked with the members of the Parish Committee, Siegfried R. Maul (President), John Grzywaczewski (Vice-President), Robert Fritz (Financial Secretary), Francis Rybak (Recording Secretary), J. Bałous (Treasurer) and Trustees Józ. Kopeć, Jan Kopeć, J. Nagórka, K. Bartosiewicz, J. Szymański, and W. Pacowski in founding a Parish supplementary school, established to educate children in the faith of the Holy Polish National Catholic Church under the guidance of the Pastor. Other Parish societies were formed including two choirs, two relief societies: the Men's St. Joseph Society and the Women's Maria Konopnicka Society, an educational group: "Ognisko," The Girl's -Children of Mary and the Young Men's — Defender's Society, a Mother's Club, and a Branch of the Polish National Union, Spójnia.

By 1971, the Parish's fiftieth anniversary, the National Church Parish of Holy Name contained about 175 parishioners.

Keep our Parish Life democratic according to our tradition. Turn in your nomination forms by January 8th. Our Church Constitution states: In administrative, managerial and social matters, this Church derives its authority from the people who build, constitute, believe in, support and care for it. It is a fundamental principle of this Church that all Parish property, whether the same be real, personal, or mixed, is the property of those united with the Parish who build and support this Church and conform to the Rite, Constitution, Principles, Laws, Rules, Regulations, Customs and Usages of this Church.
