### **Advent themes**



Advent in Year A is about getting back to basics. We remember the end of all things the first week. The second week, we focus on the righteousness and

justice God calls for, creates, and re-creates. The third week, we encounter just how full of "reversals" and "subversion" our God is. And in the fourth, we hear Matthew's story of the birth of Jesus. Jesus is our God who we will meet in the end. He is our God of passion for righteousness and justice. He is the Lord of reversals who will make the dessert bloom and who will restore us. It is He who was, and is, and ever will be "with us."

### Blessing of Opłatki and the Advent Wreath - December 1st

On the First Sunday of Advent we will bless our Advent wreath and the "Bread of Angels," the opłatki that we will share with each other, family, and friends during the Christmas Vigil. Opłatki will be available for you to take home throughout Advent and the Christmas Vigil. Please be with us to start the new Church year off right, in a spirit of prayer, repentance, charity, and anticipation.

### A time of preparation

This short Advent season will be filled with activities and preparation, for church things and in our homes. Above all, let us prepare our hearts for the newborn King – He is worth preparing for!

### **Advent Charity - food gathering**

Cuts to SNAP and WIC have resulted in hundreds of thousands of low-income women, infants, and children losing needed nutrition assistance. Vulnerable families are going hungry, and are now completely dependent on food banks. We began collecting dry and canned goods in November and will continue collecting donations through Advent. Those donations go to those in need in our local community.. Let us join in making a prayerful donation in thankfulness for the bounty God has provided in

We will also be collecting gloves, and hats for those in need in our immediate community.

The most recent U.S. census figures show an alarming statistic — 50.8 percent of Schenectady's children live below the poverty line. For a family of four, that means a yearly income of less than \$22,350. That number, provided as part of the 2011 American Community Survey, puts Schenectady 13th in the nation for highest childhood poverty rate among cities over 65,000 in population.

## Feast of Divine Love (translated to December 9th this year)

When our church was young, Bp. Hodur and the Church's Holy Synod transformed the so called Feast of the "Immaculate Conception" of B.V. Mary to the Feast of Divine Love.

The entire construct of the so called immaculate conception was based on the Roman Catholic Church's legalistic understanding of "original sin." If everyone is born in a sinful state, in original sin, inherited from their parents through the sexual act of procreation, then there has to be a specially created individual - Mary - who was preserved from original sin.

As Polish National Catholics we too believe that Mary was preserved from sin, and remained sinless and pure. But, we do not need to construct a special status for Mary because her birth and our birth are all without sin. We do not countenance the idea of original sin, that children inherit sinfulness from their parents through the sexual act of procreation. We do not accept that humans are sinful from birth. As such, we do not need a new "dogma" to specially preserve one individual.

Instead, we teach that we are all created in the image and likeness of God. We profess that creation is not evil, but that it is an expression of Divine Love. Evil is certainly real, and present in the world, the result of humanity's fall. We all fall into sin, but it is our responsibility for failing to act according to goodness of our creation.

Creation is good says Genesis, and human creation is very good. Rather than speak of the unique status of Mary, the Feast of Divine Love speaks about the goodness of creation in general as an expression of a good Creator.

The Feast of Divine Love encapsulates so much of what is positive about our Church, its focus on love and human potential. To the 1928 Synod our organizer declared: "Everything else [besides God] is transitory, but this divine element [of love] is immortal."

When we fall into sin, we know that we can always turn to God who loved us so much that He sent His only Son to us to redeem humanity from its fall into sinfulness, its propensity to reject God's Divine Love.

### **Memory Crosses**

Holy Name of Jesus is continuing a tradition begun at Good Shepherd Parish in Amsterdam. Every year the people of Good Shepherd parish would offer memory crosses during the Advent season. These hand crocheted memory crosses, in honor of dearly departed loved ones, are hung on the parish Christmas trees throughout the Christmas season. Then in January a special Holy Mass is held in memory of those entrusted to our prayers.

Memory Crosses are and are a beautiful tribute of memory and a gift of loving prayer. If you wish to remember someone special during the upcoming Christmas season please send the names of those you wish remembered, one name per memory cross, to the parish. You may offer a free will donation in honor of your loved ones. A

donation of \$2 per memory cross is suggested but is not required.

### **Church Father for the Month**

When Christ comes, God will be seen by men

From a treatise Against Heresies by Irenaeus, 130-200 A.D.

There is one God, who by his word and wisdom created all things and set them in order. His word is our Lord Jesus Christ, who in this last age became man among men to unite end and beginning, that is, man and God.

The prophets, receiving the gift of prophecy from this same Word, foretold his coming in the flesh, which brought about the union and communion between God and man ordained by the Father. From the beginning the word of God prophesied that God would be seen by men and would live among them on earth; he would speak with his own creation and be present to it, bringing it salvation and being visible to it. He would free us from the hands of all who hate us, that is, form the universal spirit of sin, and enable us to serve him in holiness and justice all our days. Man was to receive the Spirit of God and so to attain to the glory of the Father.

The prophets foretold that God would be seen by men. As the Lord himself says: *Blessed are the clean of heart, for they shall see God.* In his greatness and inexpressible glory no one can see God and live, for the Father is beyond our comprehension. But in his love and

generosity and omnipotence he allows even this to those who love him, that is, even to see God, as the prophets foretold. For what is impossible to men is possible to God.

By his own powers man cannot see God; yet God will be seen by men because he wills it. He will be seen by those he chooses, at the time he chooses, and in the way he chooses, for God can do all things. He was seen of old through the Spirit in prophecy; he is seen through the Son by our adoption as his children, and he will be seen in the kingdom of heaven in his own being as the Father. The Spirit prepares man to receive the Son of God, the Son leads him to the Father, and the Father, freeing him from change and decay, bestows the eternal life that comes to everyone from seeing God.

As those who see light are in the light sharing its brilliance, so those who see God are in God sharing his glory, and that glory gives them life. To see God is to share in life.

### **Honor St. Nicholas**

The true story of Santa Claus begins with Nicholas, who was born during the third century in the village of Patara. Nicholas used his whole inheritance to assist the needy, the sick, and the suffering. He dedicated his life to serving God and was made Bishop of Myra while still a young man. Bishop Nicholas became known throughout the land for his


generosity to the those in need, his love for children, and his concern for sailors and ships. Bishop Nicholas suffered for his faith, was exiled and imprisoned.

After his release, Nicholas attended the Council of Nicaea in 325. There he confronted the heretic Arias who taught that Jesus was not equal to God the Father. When Arias unceasingly confronted Nicholas, Nicholas slapped him.

Nicholas died December 6, 343 in Myra and was buried in his cathedral church. The commemoration of his holy death on December 6th is honored by the Holy Church.

Through the centuries St. Nicholas has continued to be venerated by the Church. By his example of generosity to those in need, especially children, St. Nicholas continues to be a model for the compassionate life.

Keeping alive simple gift-giving on December 6th, early in Advent, helps us preserve a Christmas Day focus on the Christ Child.
