Church, what a concept! We can just hear people saying that these days. Frankly, we cannot blame them. Too often church conjures up thoughts of judgment and books of rules so thick you would need a reinforced wall of shelves to hold them all. No joy.

As we begin our Advent journey toward the Lord's Nativity -Christmas - we read from the Book of Isaiah. Isaiah lived in a time of great turmoil. He encountered the Lord in a vision, the Lord enthroned in glory. The majesty, holiness and glory of the Lord took possession of his spirit and he instantly recognized the huge gap between God's perfection and human pettiness and sinfulness. How could humanity possibly approach the great goodness of God? Are we doomed to suffer and live in sadness because of this vast gap? Are those Churches that focus on the negative right?

Isaiah had an answer. No! God Himself would close the gap. He would reconcile the world in Himself and bring us complete joy.

God kept His promise, what Isaiah saw came to pass in a stable in Bethlehem. The Lord of the universe came among us to close the gap. He came to let us know that life was not about judgment and books of rules. Life is about a joyous relationship with the Lord one that will last forever - and a joyous relationship with all of our brothers and sisters. That relationship is lived in the Church.

Human pettiness and sinfulness are not our end if we trust in the Lord, if we come to the stable and let Him know that we are ready to have the life He offers. It is an abundant, fulfilling, and joy-filled life.

So, let us begin in this season of Advent preparation. Let us find those places where we fall short in our relationship with the Lord and each other, those places where we make our turmoil greater than God's power to overcome it. Let us make ourselves ready in the community of Church so we can come to the stable ready to live life abundantly.

ORDINATION TO THE HOLY PRIESTHOOD

Deacon Jim's ordination to the Holy Priesthood has been scheduled for Saturday, December 6th (the Commemoration of St. Nicholas) at 10am at St. Stanislaus Cathedral in Scranton, PA followed by a luncheon reception. We will also be holding regular private confession for youth and adults who wish to avail themselves of the beautiful Sacrament of Penance.

New Liturgical Year

With the coming of Advent we welcome a new liturgical year – happy New Church Year! We begin use of the Year B cycle of readings.

Advent theme



This year, during Advent, we encounter Mark's gospel, engage the stories of David's family, and spend considerable time in the epistles of Ephesians, Hebrews and James. We are called to remember and celebrate the culmination of all things in Christ. Consider this Advent's readings, and the season itself, as both a challenge and an invitation. Can we see and experience the reality of Christmas?

Advent puts Christmas into its proper place, not as a comforting destination or early winter way station, but rather as nothing less than the completely disruptive coming of God who, through His birth, has changed everything.

Advent helps us understand just how the news of the birth of Jesus we celebrate during Christmas Season is so very good. In Advent we see, decisively, how God's reign marks the breakdown and end of every other reign.

What the biblical writers knew, and we still know, is that every human reign is disordered, sinful, full of injustice and oppression. Those who hold power find ways to make their disordered reigns seem normal or even good. But those damaged by such disordered reigns — the silent or silenced ones including the poor, the sick, the dying, the outcast, the hungry and the persecuted — know in their bodies and psyches the wounds and scars of this disorder.

Advent tunes us in to their voices. Advent reminds us that the good news we seek, indeed the only really good news there is, is from God. He is our only hope and our sole destination. He is the place where there will be no more disorder, sorrow, pain, or tears.

Let this Advent disorient us from world's disordered view of "Christmastime" so that we might truly see what is beautiful and perfect.

Saint of the Month -St. Nicholas - generous tough guy

St. Nicholas was born during the third century in the village of Patara. He dedicated his life to serving God and was made Bishop of Myra while still a young man. His work for the Church was marked by two important facets of his personality.

Nicholas was generous. He used his whole inheritance to assist the needy, the sick, and the suffering. He was known for his generosity to the those in need, his love for children, and his concern for working people, particularly sailors.

Nicholas witnessed strongly. He endured suffered for his faith, and was exiled and imprisoned. He also defended it against all who would attack the truths of our faith. At the Council of Nicaea in 325 he confronted the heretic Arias who taught that Jesus was not equal to God the Father. When Arias unceasingly confronted Nicholas, Nicholas slapped him.

Nicholas died December 6, 343 in Myra and was buried in his cathedral church. The commemoration of his holy death on December 6th is honored by our Holy Church and his commemoration was chosen by our Prime Bishop and Diocesan Bishop for Deacon Jim's ordination to the Holy Priesthood.

May the example of St. Nicholas continue to infuse our lives with generosity and strength in defending the Holy faith.

You revealed yourself, O saint, in Myra as a priest, For you fulfilled the Gospel of Christ by giving up your soul for your people, and saving the innocent from death. Therefore you are blessed as one become wise in the grace of God.

Annual dues



Many have fought through the years to maintain and strengthen the democratic tradition of our Holy Church. Our Church is

unique among all Churches in this regard - where all <u>members</u> have a voice and a vote, where they are guaranteed accountability, where money doesn't go into hidden accounts, and where no one can close their parish.

Membership requires the payment of annual dues which support the larger Church, our Diocese, and our Parish.

During Holy Synod the people of the

Church voted to increase dues by \$45 per year (really only 86 cents per week). If anyone has trouble meeting this obligation please let Deacon Jim know privately and we will work with you.

Dues are now \$137 per year for adult members, \$112 for seniors 65 and over.

Payment of dues gives you a voice and a vote and the ability to run for a position on the Parish Committee. It also allows you to represent the parish and vote at Diocesan and General Church Synods.
