The word 'ab·ba' in Aramaic corresponds to the emphatic or definite form of 'av,' literally meaning "the father," or "O Father." It was the intimate name used by children for their fathers and combines some of the intimacy of the English word "papa" while retaining the dignity of the word "father," being both informal and yet respectful. It was, therefore, an endearing form of address rather than a title and was among the first words a child learned to speak.

Jesus called God, in the person of His Father, Abba. In using the term He spoke of the deep love and respect He had for His Father. St. Paul, in writing to the Romans, tells that we are to call the Father Abba. We are not to be a people who are enslaved to or fearful of our God. We are to see Him as sons and daughters; we are to approach Him in the same spirit that Jesus

expressed, a spirit of love and respect.

Our God sent His Son, Jesus, to show us this very fact. We are not distant from God and our God is not the kind of god so many fear. Our God is Abba to us.

The good fathers among us engender that spirit in us, their children. They bring us up to be people of love and respect toward God and toward them, to have confidence that we are God's and their beloved children. For this we love, respect, and thank them.

When we face fears, and those do come, we should reflect on the fact that we are children of fathers and the Father whose love surpasses any fear. We can face anything knowing that even if it seems unsurpassable, our destiny with Abba makes them nothing. So too when we are tempted to worship the gods of fear and worldliness. We are children of Abba alone.

Need a career change?

The month of June is career change month - better known as Sacred Vocations month in our Church.

Will a career change to the sacred ministry bring lots of wealth? Perhaps not in the sense most people think, but a kind of wealth and security that surpasses any other career. It actually makes



sense and there's nothing to fear from our Father who calls us to serve Him and Him alone.

And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." Immediately they left their nets and followed him. — Matthew 4:19-20

Do I have a vocation? In simple words, yes, we all do. God has a role for each of us in His kingdom. But, how can I be sure that God is calling me to a life of professional commitment to His people through ministry in the Church?

Some people can enter a church and feel suddenly at peace. Some are taken by the beauty of the Eucharist or a liturgical service. Some feel a passion for proclaiming God's word and for teaching. Some see the suffering or need in their brothers and sisters and want to help – not just with the immediate need but with God's eternal love. Others look to the holy example of the saints and modern heroes, who espouse and live according to God's word, and seek to follow that example.

Yes, each person has a role in God's Kingdom. The role is clearest when we listen to God's plan for us. When we wipe away the facades and the pretenses, and stand before God as the people we really are. When we do this we can say to the Lord – "Here I am, I heard you calling" We are then ready to strive to meet that calling with all our energy, freely giving of ourselves and our talents in the process.

Giving ourselves to God does not

necessarily require us to commit to the life of a priest or deacon. It does require that we give ourselves to God fully in each thing we do. It requires us to see Christ in all of our brothers and sisters – especially in those where it is most difficult to find Him.

If you have undertaken and committed to a process of striving to follow God's will in everything you do, and have done so for quite a while, you may be at the right moment in your life – a moment in which God is clearly calling you to investigate making a full time commitment to Him as a priest or deacon.

A commitment at this level is filled with rewards, the greatest of which is serving the Lord. At the same time there are necessary sacrifices. As with any vocation the rewards and sacrifices are in balance as long as the individual taking them on is in balance. In the ministry this balance is aided by God's gift of Grace imparted at ordination.

Are you ready to "Come and See"?
Now is the time to explore the possibilities of a life in the ministry of the Church. Whether you are married or single, a recent graduate, or on your second or third career, the Church encourages you to "Come and See".

Poetry for the Month

"What My Father Believed" by John Guzlowski, from Lightning And Ashes. © Steel Toe Books, 2007.

He didn't know about the Rock of Ages or bringing in the sheaves or Jacob's ladder or gathering at the beautiful river that flows beneath the throne of God. He'd never heard of the Baltimore Catechism

either, and didn't know the purpose of life was to love and honor and serve God.

He'd been to the village church as a boy in Poland, and knew he was Catholic because his mother and father were buried in a cemetery under wooden crosses. His sister Catherine was buried there too.

The day their mother died Catherine took to the kitchen corner where the stove sat, and cried. She wouldn't eat or drink, just cried

until she died there, died of a broken heart. She was three or four years old, he was five.

What he knew about the nature of God and religion came from the sermons the priests told at mass, and this got mixed up

with his own life. He knew living was hard, and that even children are meant to suffer. Sometimes, when he was drinking he'd ask, "Didn't God send his own son here to suffer?"

My father believed we are here to lift logs that can't be lifted, to hammer steel nails so bent they crack when we hit them. In the slave labor camps in Germany, He'd seen men try the impossible and fail.

He believed life is hard, and we should help each other. If you see someone on a cross, his weight pulling him down and breaking his muscles, you should try to lift him, even if only for a minute, even though you know lifting won't save him.

In your wisdom and love you made all things.

Bless these men, that they may be strengthened as Christian fathers. Let the example of their faith and love shine forth.

Grant that we, their sons and daughters, may honor them always with a spirit of profound respect.


