Beginnings and endings

As we send this newsletter we are in the midst of Lent. By the time March is over we will be living in the Easter season, celebrating the Solemnity of the Resurrection.

Beginnings and endings can come in many forms - great beginnings, bad endings; bad beginnings, great endings; bad both ways; great both ways.

We tend to like beginnings they are filled with possibility. We tend to dislike endings because they are a break, a separation, the end.

Our faith in Christ turns the idea of beginnings and endings on its head. Our beginnings in Him, at baptism, as we receive the sacraments, and every step along the way are filled with goodness and hope. In Him there is no ending, hope reigns eternally in His promise to us - that there is a place prepared for us in heaven. Our walk through Lent is a time of new beginnings, an opportunity to reconnect to the life of faith, to repent of our brokenness, to rebuild relationships with our Church and with others. It is a time of possibility. As we walk through these last few weeks of Lent, the Passiontide, and Holy Week let us take advantage of these possibilities.

With Easter we come to recognize that there is no ending. We realize that the "ending" the disciples saw on Good Friday which scared them and filled them with sadness - was not an ending at all. Rather it was, in itself, a new beginning. It was the payment that freed us from sin and the law. It was our salvation and redemption. On Easter we experience the fulfillment of that freedom. We see the resurrected Christ, His glorified body. We too will walk in glorified bodies, into eternity, without end.

We so look forward to seeing you over the next few weeks. Passiontide starts March 17th with Holy Mass at 11am along with our annual Lenten penitential service. March 24th is Palm Sunday. We will keep you informed as to the times of services during Holy Week. This all culminates on Easter Sunday with our Resurrection service at 8am - a glorious time in the life of faith, our faith community, and the Holy Church.

Walk with Jesus in the days and weeks leading up to Easter so as to rejoice with Him in His resurrection.



Our Holy Church



On Sunday, March 11th we observe the Solemnity of the Institution of the Polish National Catholic Church.

In 1896 the brave people of Scranton formed ranks. They consulted democratically, with their brothers **and** sisters building a new church. Within the few winter months, the structure was nearly complete and the people looked for a priest who would love and serve the people, who would not condemn them or use them only as a source of money. The people unanimously elected Father Franciszek Hodur as their spiritual leader.

The evening of March 14, 1897 became a solemn moment for the people with the arrival of Father Hodur in Scranton. On taking an oath before the people he swore to lead them regardless of whether or not the local Roman Catholic bishop gave his consent for the free church. Around 400 hands were raised to give evidence that the people, except for God and His Revelation, did not acknowledge any other authority in matters of holy faith than that of Father Hodur.

The people of Scranton, as well as Buffalo and Chicago had come to the realization that only righteous and holy bishops and priests, those having sacramental union with God, could validly bless and discipline the Christian people. They organized a Church where every man and woman had a voice and vote, where all own and control the property of the Church they built. A Church where the peace, harmony, and salvation of the people come first.

Parish Organizations and Ministries


Did you know that our Parish has many organizations that <u>need</u> you?
