FOR YOU KNOW THAT THE TESTING OF YOUR FAITH PRODUCES
STEADFASTNESS.

Jesus said many things that people loved to hear. They were reaffirming and hope-filled. He also said many things people could not understand or did not like. When Jesus brought up particularly hard sayings those who were following Him walked away. They could not accept the new life or joy He was offering exactly because it was hard. Over the past few months, concentrating on the Gospel according to St. Luke, we heard many difficult sayings: *Even the servant who was ignorant of his master's will but acted in a way deserving of a severe beating shall be beaten. Or, Do you think that I have come to establish peace on the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division. Or, anyone of you who does not renounce all his possessions cannot be my disciple.*

We might say to ourselves, I sure wish Jesus hadn't said those things. My life is hard enough as it is. I'm really trying, how much can God expect of me? We started this year with a focus on finding joy in our our faith. How can we be joyful

hearing all this?

It may seem a simple analogy, but think of it this way: God is our Father and wants only what is best for us. As our parents do good for us so God constantly does good for us. He tells us the things we need to hear. Things that will bring real and everlasting joy.

What we most need to hear in our time is that we must give up preconceptions, prejudices, and anything that might block us from finding true joy. Instead of imagining Jesus' sayings as hard, we should take a different approach. Perhaps it is to say: If I let go, if I give up, if I surrender to God's way of life, I will be truly free. Nothing will hold me down. No one, no matter what they say or do, can wipe joy from my life. My life is in Jesus!

Each of us tries to rearrange Jesus' phrases to make ourselves more comfortable. But comfort is not the great gift Jesus came to bring. That gift is a joy-filled life lasting forever.

We will celebrate the Solemnity of All Saints on Tuesday, November 1st with Holy Mass at 7pm along with the reading of the names of all the faithful departed.

Fr. Jim will also celebrate the memory of the faithful departed interred at Good Shepherd cemetery on Sunday, November 6th at 2pm.

IMPORTANT NOTICE Cemeteries

Our parish is blessed to serve two beautiful cemeteries. These are peaceful final resting places for our loved ones, and perhaps may be our resting place when the Lord calls us home.



One of the Church's Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy is to bury and pray for the dead. Those Works of Mercy include maintaining grave sites.

Further, this is a legal obligation imposed on the parish. This cannot happen if we fail to contribute toward the care of our parish and our cemeteries. To make

all this happen it is essential that rules be obeyed.

All parishioners and those who believe they will be buried in these cemeteries are reminded:

- Only faithful members of the Polish National Catholic Church will be buried in these cemeteries. To be a faithful member one must: *contribute offerings, labor and life to fulfill the goals of his Parish and the entire Church; believe and receive the holy Sacraments, believe in the ideals, principles and aims of this Church; comply with the Constitution and Laws thereof; and by personal charity and active cooperation with the Bishops, Pastor and lay members of the Parish help realize the aims and mission of this Church. Members of the Church have a twofold duty: spiritual and material.* (Excerpt from the Constitution and Laws of the PNCC, Article III)
- Failure to pay dues for two years allows the parish to re-possess and resell grave sites.
- If dues are not paid, five (5) years of dues must be paid-in-full before any burial takes place. This will amount to at least \$960 which includes \$400 in parish fees.
- Current dues are \$137 per year for adult members, \$112 for seniors 65 and over.

No burial at Holy Name of Jesus or Good Shepherd cemeteries will be allowed to those who do not adhere to these precepts and rules.

As Christ followers we are not bound to any ideology, party or even form of government. We are above those things and are citizens of His kingdom. During these days of political tension and conflict let us practice forgiveness and remember where our true home is.

Sacrament of the Sick - Holy Unction

Whenever people see a Catholic Priest in the hospital they automatically think the priest is there because someone is close to dying. However, the Sacrament of Holy Unction is a Sacrament specifically designed for those who are ill.

In Holy Scripture, We read: *"Is anyone sick among you? Let them bring the priests of the Church and let them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord."* (James 5:14).

From the earliest days of the Church, this Sacrament of the Sick

has been administered by the priests of the Church to those who are ill. The effect of the Sacrament is to absolutely restore health to the soul and possibly restore health to the body or mind.

The priest should be asked to administer this Sacrament whenever there is a chronic or serious (not necessarily fatal) illness.

Keep Holy the Sabbath Day

24/7 culture brings change for traditional day of rest.

Once, within living memory, Sunday was a day set apart in many places; a 24 hour stretch of family time when liquor was not available, church was the rule, shopping was impossible and weekend staples like tending the lawn met with disapproval.

But America changed, and it dragged Sunday along.

Though Sunday still means worship and family time for millions of Americans, today it also means other things - 12 pack of beer, the NFL on TV, catching up with errands.

"Today, for a lot of Americans,

Sunday's just another day when many people have to work," says a labor historian at Lebanon Valley College.

In a land where the pursuit of happiness is a part of the national charter, evolution attests to Americans' both haired lives and determination to wring every drop out of every day.

The Protestant notion of Sunday began to change in the 1800s with immigrant laborers. Many were devoted to "a Sunday that took a very different shape - church in the morning and leisure in the afternoon," says Alexis McCrossan,

author of "Holy Day, Holiday: The American Sunday."

The 21st century brought pushes toward a shorter work week. At the same time commercial culture really took hold.

These days, it's unimaginable to many Americans: A mall closed on Sunday? The

supermarket unavailable?

The words - "Remember the Sabbath Day by keeping it Holy" - Exodus 20:8 it has some merit.
