Finally, an authentic Christian loves and obeys the Word of God. We chose to walk according to His teaching.

Let us commend ourselves to others as Jesus' authentic followers with confession, repentance, fellowship, obedience, genuineness, and truthful speech. By doing so, the power of God will show through us. We, like Mary, will glow with His real and genuine love. We will be real!

Bishop Joseph Padewski, Martyr

On Tuesday, May 10th, we commemorate the 66th anniversary of Bishop Joseph Padewski.

Bishop Padewski was born February 18, 1894 in Antoniów, a small farming village near Radom in Poland. He emigrated to the United States in 1913 and moved to Detroit, Michigan. In Detroit he came into contact with the Polish National Catholic Church. In 1916 he entered the PNCC Seminary. He was ordained to the priesthood on December 16, 1919 by Prime Bishop Francis Hodur. He celebrated his first mass at the Church of the Good Shepherd in Plymouth, Pennsylvania.

In 1942 Bishop Padewski was arrested by the Nazis and was held at the Montelupich prison in Krakow. He was then transferred to the Tittmoning POW Camp in Germany where he was held for 18 months. Through the intervention of the Swiss Red Cross he was freed and returned to the United States in March 1944.

Between 1944 and 1946 Bishop Padewski served as pastor of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Czestochowa Church in Albany, New York.

Bishop Padewski returned to Poland on February 20, 1946 to resume his duties as Bishop of the Polish branch of the PNCC.

Shortly after his return, the Soviet Union completed its takeover of Poland and asserted Communist control. In this atmosphere of Stalinist terror, Bishop Padewski was arrested by the Communist Secret Police (UB) in Warsaw and was held at their prison on Rakowieckiej Street.

Bishop Padewski died on May 10, 1951 as a result of secret police questioning and maltreatment.

Ralph F. Boyd, Sr. Scholarship

The Schenectady County Human Rights Commission MLK Coalition is accepting applications for the Ralph F. Boyd, Sr. Award which provides \$1,000 to a Schenectady County High School student to use toward their post High School education.

Mr. Ralph F. Boyd, Sr. was instrumental in starting the Schenectady County Chapter of the NAACP, the Carver Community Center, the Head Start Program at SCAP, and the Baptist Retirement Center. He is active in the Veterans of Foreign Wars and earned the Distinguished Service Award and two Bronze Stars in World War II. This award is presented annually to a youth who reflects the commitment to human rights that Mr. Boyd, Sr. demonstrates every day.

The student should be a senior in High School and someone who has demonstrated a commitment of time and effort to programs, projects or initiatives focusing on human/ civil rights. This student should also be admitted to a two/ four year college or a career-based program.

Students must submit a one-page statement describing their involvement with human/civil rights issues. A one-page letter of support from a faculty member and evidence of admission to college or a career-based program is also required. Entries must be postmarked no later than May 15, 2017.

We Are Called to Baptize the Culture

Every age has certainly had its challenges when it comes to following God and the truth He's revealed. Today's culture with its dominant secularist 'religion' of humanism is no different.

Increasingly, our Christian beliefs are coming under assault, religious liberties are being challenged in many places.

The Sunday of the Myrrh-bearing women (the women who came to anoint the body of Jesus in the tomb) would have us draw some lessons from their courage, living in a culture where they faced great dangers for witnessing to their faith in Christ. They didn't hold back or bow to the pressure to keep silent. We recall that while the disciples fled, the holy myrrh-bearers were the first to bravely come to Christ's tomb. Likewise, St. Joseph of Arimathea boldly asked for Jesus' body even as St. Peter denied him three times.

The Faith is the same yesterday, today, and forever, not because it's a collection of manmade, and therefore, changeable doctrines, but because it's the timeless truth of relationship, communion with God, as He's revealed Himself to His Church from the beginning.

Those of us living in this age where sin is increasingly defined subjectively and personally, need to remember that the Faith has been "once delivered to the Saints" (Jude 1:3). Being faithful means we don't change that 'faith once received'; rather, we become grafted into it into an ever deeper communion with Christ's reality.

To this end, St. Paul warns us, saying, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind..." (Rom. 12:2)

We're called to be vigilant in not preferring our own ideas, preferences, or that of the rapidly changing norms of our culture, which are constantly being hammered into us, over the timeless truth that Christ is. He has entrusted His truth to us so we might experience the fullness of life in Him, find healing, and become inheritors of eternal salvation.

Living in our culture challenges us as Christians to such an extent that we may find ourselves 'unpopular', labeled politically 'incorrect,' narrowminded, bigoted. The temptation to "fit in," to compromise the faith, can be great—to begin to think that maybe what the culture is saying in contrast to the truth is, well, somehow okay or 'reasonable'.

But we can't be faithful and embrace that which is contrary to the Faith, the life He's entrusted to us. We are called to be strong and courageous, humble lovers of the truth—just as were the holy Myrrhbearers who came to the tomb, when no one else would, just as the pious Joseph was when he asked for Christ's body when no one else would.

We are called, by virtue of our baptism, to transform the culture, to baptize the culture, not to conform our faith to the culture. This is hard; this increasingly sets us apart, someday, it may even be a risk for imprisonment or death, but this is also the way of love, the way of witness, the way that preserves the hope of salvation for all. This is the way of courage modeled by the countless Saints before us.

The question for us is this: Will we be like those who flee, deny, or succumb to the culture out of fear, or will we be humbly courageous like the Myrrh-bearing women and St. Joseph of Arimathea, who loved God more than they feared man?

Strengthened by the gifts of the Holy Spirit, I promise to do all in my power to live according to the Commandments of God and fulfill His holy will. I promise to avoid sin, the occasion of sin and evil companionship. I promise to remember always, and in all places, that I am a member of the Polish National Catholic Church and to faithfully fulfill all my obligations towards this Church. So help me, God, one in the Blessed Trinity and all the saints. Amen.

During the month ahead, in preparation for pentecost sunday, let us offer this Prayer to the Holy Spirit: (2006 PNCC Missal - Mass of Pentecost)

Let us pray: Holy Spirit, Giver of Life, Who proceeds from the Father, have mercy on us. As You descended upon the disciples in the upper room, so now once again descend upon Your Church. Inflame our hearts, enlighten our minds and purify our souls. For together with the Father and the Son You live and reign, one God, forever and ever.
