A poor widow also came and put in two small coins worth a few cents. Calling his disciples to himself, he said to them, "Amen, I say to you, this poor widow put in more than all the other contributors to the treasury. For they have all contributed from their surplus wealth, but she, from her poverty, has contributed all she had, her whole livelihood."

Before I begin discussion of today's readings and Gospel, I am going to clue you in on next week; give you a preview of what is to come. It is, in fact, about what is to come: "And then they will see 'the Son of Man coming in the clouds' with great power and glory

The widow in today's Gospel had all that in mind. She knew it before Jesus even said it. It was written on her heart. The end will

come. God will gather His elect. Where will I stand? She decided to stand with God's warriors; with those who were, and are today, all in.

Many gloss over today's gospel as a lesson in generosity, about giving to the church. There is that lesson which is pretty easy to grasp. As Christians however, we are asked to look beyond mere appearance, outward signs, to what lies beneath. In the Gospel according to St. John, Jesus tells us: "Stop judging by outward appearances, and start judging justly." Jesus wants us to get at deeper truth, the full impact of His Good News.

Going deeper into the Word of God calls us to go deeper into His life giving way. We are called to do as the widow did, to throw it all in to say – nothing is more valuable than God's way, to doing it. We are called to that walk with Him in complete faith and confidence.

100th Anniversary of Polish Independence

On November 11, 1918, at the 11th hour, World War I ended, and in that moment the formal Nation of Poland was reborn. This year is the 100th anniversary of Swięto Dzień Niepodległości - the Day of Independence.

Poland was divided by the autocratic powers of Germany, Russia, and Austria-Hungary in 1793. These powers were responding to the Constitution of 1791 that granted the right to vote and other freedoms. They feared the spread of such freedoms and saw them as a threat to their dictatorial powers. Poland remained divided for 123 years. On three occasions, 1794, 1830, and 1863, Poles led insurrections to regain their territorial integrity and freedom.

The return of Polish independence was due, in large measure, to Americans of Polish heritage. Many had joined the Free Polish Army - known as the Blue Army. The Blue Army trained in Ft. Erie, just across the boarder from Niagara Falls, NY, and fought in Europe for Poland's freedom

The dream and work of Bishop Hodur and the organizers of the Polish National Catholic Church was realized in the regaining of independence. Even so, after the war, Bishop Hodur and the Church had to fight in Polish courts for religious freedom so that our Church might serve people back in their homeland.

The history of Poland is replete with tales of bravery, to standing up against insurmountable odds such as when Poland fought off Russian Armies in 1920 who were seeking to conquer all of Europe for the purpose of spreading communism. Its main contribution, however, is the establishment of a pluralistic, religiously free country. From the General Charter of Jewish liberties in 1264 of complete religious freedom in 1573 and the welcoming of Protestant refugees from all over Europe - Poland exemplified freedom. Let us pray for Poland this day, so that the ideals of freedom, pluralism, and welcome may grow and so that xenophobia, mistaken ideas based on Roman Catholic religious nationalism, and attempts at autocratic rule may be thwarted.

The Lord goes out like a mighty man, like a man of war he stirs up his zeal; he cries out, he shouts aloud, he shows himself mighty against his foes.
