BUT ON THE FIRST DAY OF THE WEEK, AT EARLY DAWN, THEY WENT TO THE TOMB, TAKING THE SPICES WHICH THEY HAD PREPARED.

They came, so sad, with faces stained;

Behind them the rays of a new dawn flamed.

All about them heaven with glory began to open...

The partial stanza above is from the poem *The Resurrection* by Fr. Walter Hyszko. This and other poems by Fr. Hyszko can be found in his book, Ode to Great Men and Great Things in Poetry and Prose.

This poem is so appropriate to us. It reflects on the early morning walk Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women took to the tomb. They were deeply saddened, faces tear stained from prolonged crying. Their hearts were broken.

In their sadness, they set out to commit a final act of love toward Jesus, to anoint His dead body with spices. He was dead.

Fr. Hyszko paints a picture in words. They reflect what we may be experiencing Easter Sunday morning if we have walked with Jesus throughout Lent, if we actually spent time in church from Maundy Thursday through Holy Saturday. The weight of Jesus betrayal, arrest, torture, death, and the ensuing silence after burial weighs heavy on us. Our sinfulness, our failures, our unwillingness to be there for Jesus, presses on us. We feel death's press and we miss it.

As Fr. Hyszko points out, the Marys, Joanna, and the other women missed it too: Rays of a new day flamed / heaven with glory began to open. All those things that weigh on us, all the tears and regrets in our lives have been covered in the redeeming blood of Jesus. We have been washed and made new. That day burned forth as new - a new era - rebirth into a time where heaven is open. The doors have been unbarred. Death has been crushed by death. He lives!

The last line of the poem's first stanza says: Yet the thrall of grief remained unbroken. Do not let your grief remain unbroken this Easter for we are made new. Rejoice!!!

We will begin at The Bridge Church and then proceed to Global Prophetic Ministries,


Faith Deliverance Tabernacle, New Day C.E.C., and Holy Name of Jesus.

How to say Happy Easter

The Paschal greeting is an Easter custom among Christians. Instead of saying "hello," "good morning," or some other greeting we are to greet each other with "Christ is Risen!" The proper response is "Truly, He is Risen." In some cultures, such as in Russia it is also customary to exchange a triple kiss on the alternating cheeks after the greeting (what a great custom!). Here is the Pascal greeting in several languages:

- English: Christ is Risen! Truly He is Risen!
- Spanish: *iCristo ha resucitado! iEn verdad ha resucitado!*
- Italian: *Cristo è risorto! È veramente risorto!*
- Polish: Chrystus zmartwychwstał!

Prawdziwie zmartwychwstał!

- Swahili Kristo Amefufukka! Kweli Amefufukka!
- German: Christus ist auferstanden! Er ist wahrhaftig auferstanden!
- Norwegian: Kristus er oppstanden! Han er sannelig oppstanden!
- Rastafarian Krestos a uprisin!
 Seen, him a uprisin fe tru!
- French: Christ est ressuscité! Il est vraiment ressuscité!
- Greek: Χριστός ἀνέστη! ἀληθῶς ανέστη!
- •Russian: *Христос воскрес!*Воистину воскрес!
- Gaelic: *Tá Críost éirithe! Go deimhin, tá sé éirithe!*
- Scottish: Tha Crìosd air èiridh! Gu dearbh, tha e air èiridh!

Music Scholarships

The Church's Music Scholarship Program was instituted on August 8,



1964 by the Sixth General Convention of the National United Choirs of the Polish National Catholic Church held in

Carnegie, PA. The program was implemented at the Seventh General Convention held in Cleveland, OH, on August 4, 1966, when the first awards were presented. The Music Scholarship Program was instituted and tailored to develop musicians within the Polish National Catholic Church. The program was further expanded to establish a chair of music at Savonarola Theological Seminary in Scranton, PA, and to make scholarships available in other areas of music to enrich the musical life of the church.

With the 2018 Scholarships, the Church has given out 1,095 scholarships totaling \$316,985.

Three Truths for Lasting Life Change

Is there an area in your life that you really want to change, and you know God wants to change, but you

feel stuck? Perhaps it is a critical attitude you can't get rid of or an addiction you can't shake.

Jesus' game plan for each and every one of us is that we would be transformed. Just as a caterpillar is transformed into a beautiful butterfly, we also should be "metamorphose-ized" when Christ comes into our lives. This is a process through which our character becomes more and more like Christ.



But if this is God's plan, ever wonder why is it so difficult for many of us?

We can take comfort that even the Apostle Paul struggled at times. He said, "For I have the desire to do what is good, but I cannot carry it out. For I do not do the good I want to do, but the evil I do not want to do—this I keep on doing." (Romans 7:18-19)

He's basically saying, "I want to do what's right. But I find myself not doing it. And the very thing I don't want to do, I find myself doing that."

Sound familiar?

He goes on to say, "Now, if I do what I do not want to do, it's no longer I who do it, but it's sin living in me that does it. What a wretched man that I am! Who will rescue me

from this body of death?" (v. 20, 24)

And then, he gives us the answer: "Thanks be to God – through Jesus Christ our Lord!" (v. 25)

And so the question for us becomes: How did Jesus conquer sin, and how does that work out for us practically in everyday life?

We live in an existential world, so we think that life change is about trying harder. We think there's some formula.

But the Christian life isn't about trying hard to live like Jesus or achieving some morality.

The Christian life is a relationship with God the Father through the work of the cross. When we are united to Him by faith, we are co-crucified and co-resurrected. As the Spirit enters our life, we begin to live a new life.

True life change – from the inside out – always begins with truth. And whatever is true of Jesus also becomes true for us.

Here are three truths you need to believe and live out in order to have lasting life change:

You are free. Sin's power was broken when Christ died on the cross and rose from the dead three days later.

You are forgiven. Not only has sin's power been broken, but sin's penalty has been paid for. When Christ hung upon the cross – the sins of all people of all time – were

placed on Him and He absorbed it in our place.

You are secure. Death doesn't have dominance over you anymore because you have eternal life. The moment you turned from your sin and trusted in Christ, the Spirit of God came into you, sealed you with His Spirit, and adopted you into His family. He took you from the kingdom of darkness into the kingdom of light, gave you a new relationship with God the Father, a relationship with a supernatural community called the body of Christ, and an eternal inheritance.

These are facts.

You can choose to give in to sin, give in to temptation, or be fearful of demonic spirits, but as a believer, you can also look death and sin straight in the eye and realize it doesn't have power over you anymore.

This is the beginning of lasting life change. You can feel it or not feel it, but the truth is that you're forgiven, you're free, and you're secure.
