

As a Church dedicated to scripture, and considering that we classify the proclamation and teaching of God's word as a sacrament. let's take a moment to consider the Bible.

I remember classes from grade school on up - and the oft repeated question - what is the Bible? The expected, technical answer, which most kids got wrong? The Bible is a Book of Books.

A Book of Books? Makes it seem as if the Bible is a kind of library, and indeed it could be considered that. However, my classmates and I would invariably get the 'answer' wrong, blurting out - "It is a book."

But what if we were right?

My classmates and I <u>were</u> right because perhaps, by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, we were seeing the bigger picture, the completeness, the wholeness of scripture.

All of scripture, from its inspired

stories, histories, prophecies, and poetry in the Old Testament is one. It points invariably to the coming salvation found only in Jesus Christ. The Gospels give us Jesus in His complete revelation - the call to live life as He lived, the call to be a true sons and daughters of the Father as He is the Son of the Father. The invitation to accept Him as our Savior by confession of our sin and belief by faith. The remainder of the New Testament interprets the Gospel into keys for daily living within the wholeness of the Christian community.

We dedicate the month of November to remembering our dearly departed. We have a lesson here. The wholeness and completeness of scripture is life's model, who we are and where we are going. Life is not a series of separate stories and events, just a book of books, or unrelated chapters. Our life extends from birth to eternity. We are not just separate people and events. We live in a continuum that has, as its goal and end, life in the eternal wholeness and completeness of God Who holds all things together.

He first came to Holy Name of Jesus parish to assist Fr. Dr. śp. Jonathan Trela during his time of illness and continued his pastorship through 2011.

WHAT'S GOING ON?

Recently, the Roman Catholic Church held a Synod of the Amazon. You may have heard news of this event. I hope, by this writing, to provide some clarity.

The Synod recommended married priests? Yes and no. In a funny way, the Roman Church might seem to be catching up with us after nearly 100 years, but it is not guite true. The recommendation is to appoint "viri probati" or virtuous elderly men who have lived holy lives to act as "priests" only in the sense of offering Holy Mass for the purpose of confecting the Eucharist and offering Holy Communion. Ordination would only be available to these "viri probati" in remote areas of the Amazon that are unserved by priests. These priests would not be able to offer confession or preach.

Women Deacons? The Synod recommended, as these events typically do, that the issue be studied by a commission. That

commission has existed on and off for decades.

What is a Pachamama? In advance of the Synod an ancient Amazonian goddess, the Pachamama (mother earth) was paraded into the Vatican garden in the presence of the Bishop of Rome and was later placed in one of Rome's churches where it, along with other symbols (including a canoe and an image of a woman nursing a dog/weasel) were literally worshiped. Priests and others bowed to the ground before these images. To put in practical terms, it would be as if we placed images of mother earth goddesses Gaia, Cybele, Ceres, Proserpina, Matka Ziemia, Zemyna, Prithvi, the Native American Spider Grandmother, or Norse Sif in our parish or cathedral - and then worshiped them. This horror should be immediately startling to our consciences and offensive to every child of God. As Israel turned from God to worship the Baals and Asherah poles, so Rome has invited in false gods for worship. It makes no sense to anyone who calls themselves Christian.

The organization of the Roman Church is such that they must adhere to what the Bishop of Rome does, for he has complete and universal jurisdictional authority. This structural issue, what we in church circles call Ecclesiastical polity, helps to create confusion for the Roman faithful and others by leadership setting bad example. It is scandalous. Let us be ready to offer sanctuary to those who worship the one true God in His Son Who is the Way, Truth, and Life.

Let us pray also that Rome turns from this scandal and listens to the voice of God who declares: Thou shalt have no other gods before me. Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image, or any likeness of any thing that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. Thou shalt not bow down thyself to them, nor serve them...

What if the whole world came together on one day to give?

How to Lift People Up

Out of all the countless gifts God has given us, I believe one stands out as the most powerful: The gift of speech.

Think about it. Contrary to that oftrepeated childhood saying about sticks and stones, words have the power to bring life or take it away.

Proverbs 10:11 says, "The mouth of the righteous is a fountain of life, but the mouth of the wicked conceals violence."

Proverbs 15:4 says, "The soothing tongue is a tree of life, but a perverse tongue crushes the spirit."

Read those verses again, out loud! Your mouth – the words that come out of it – can be a fountain of life. Your tongue – your language – can be not only soothing, but life giving. Awesome!

And the opposite? What a contrast! Violence. Crushed spirits.

Yes, our speech has amazing power to lay people low, or lift them up. As Christians, we are called to build up our fellow believers, our family members, our friends, our neighbors, and the strangers we meet.

Encouragement, you see, is you being who God has made you to be so that others can be who He designed them to be. Encouragement helps others take the "next step" they couldn't take on their own, allowing them to become more like

Christ. How can we become these kind of encouragers?

The apostle Paul is a model for us. He underwent endless trials as he traveled the known world spreading the news of the resurrected Messiah, the Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. But he never failed to be an encouragement to those he encountered. In his first letter to the church of the Thessalonians, he writes this:

"Grace and peace to you. We always thank God for all of you and continually mention you in our prayers. We remember before our God and Father your work produced by faith, your labor prompted by love, and your endurance inspired by hope in our Lord Jesus Christ."

Let's take a look at some ways to speak life to those that we love. Paul starts by bestowing a blessing. Of course, you would be looked at weird if you used Paul's language today. But there are so many ways to bless people. Tell them you're praying for them. Remind them how privileged you feel to be their friend. Listen to them. Send an email or an old-fashioned card, or better yet, make a phone call.

What you're communicating is, "You matter. You matter to me and you matter to God."

Paul goes on to show his appreciation. He first gives thanks, specifically acknowledging their faith, their love, and their endurance. This shows that he knows these people, and values them. It's like he's saying, "You've got this, folks. I see you. I appreciate you!"

Do you do that? Maybe you have the tendency to wait until you see things

done perfectly, or behavior that's righteous. Don't wait!

I also want to encourage you to verbalize your confidence in other people's faith. Deep down I believe everyone thinks that others are way more spiritual than they are. Part of that may be because we're not verbalizing what we see in other's walk with Jesus.

When was the last time you told someone how seeing God work in them is an encouragement to you? We're little mirrors to one another, and we all need that.

Those who constantly lift people up are doing the work of the Spirit. The power of an affirming word given specifically, lovingly, and authentically, as God leads, is absolutely beyond what you can imagine.

Encourage someone today!


