"BLESSED ARE YOU WHO ARE HUNGRY NOW, FOR YOU SHALL BE SATISFIED.
"BLESSED ARE YOU WHO WEEP NOW, FOR YOU SHALL LAUGH."

I am hungry.

We previously considered so much to be a part of normal routine. Much of it now fades away, and rightly so. There are certainly things in normal routine that we have learned are not all that important. We have reprioritized our cares.

Some of our hungers are now better satisfied. That hunger for more family time - we have it. The hunger for less competition, less pushing and shoving, more thoughtfulness in our routines - we have that too. The hunger to get projects done, to take account of what is important - we have certainly had the time to undertake those projects and assess importance. The hunger to pray more, read scripture, and study - hopefully those are underway.

If we take one more step back from those things and take the eternal view, there is something even greater that we hunger for, that I hunger for - it is our joint worship at the table of the Lord. It is physically sharing in that moment where heaven and earth are joined in the

inexpressible precious, magnificent, and mystical moment of Eucharist. The elements of bread and wine are transformed into Jesus' precious body and blood and we adore together. We then step forward to be fed God by the Hand of God.

For each of us, church may have been another ordinary routine. Now we cannot gather as we did. We, even the servers and musicians present with me, cannot receive at the table. The Fast of Lent has carried forward, for we are deprived of the Bread of Life, the Cup of Salvation. This is a hunger pain beyond comprehension. It hurts!

Jesus pointed out that the hungry would be satisfied, that those of us who really get it and weep now (you know I am emotional, but now I tend to cry at the slightest thing), will laugh.

The sacrifice carries on. The mystical union is not ended, it will not end. The bread is prepared. Feel the hunger and cry now in prayer knowing that we will be satisfied and laugh. He promised!

St. Paul wrote extensively on giving and he called Christians to account if they fell short. In 2 Corinthians 8:7 he says: *But as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in all earnestness, and in our love for you – see that you excel in this act of grace also.*

Paul is speaking in context. He is talking about the generosity of the Macedonian Christians who were giving out of extreme poverty. Paul is challenging the Corinthian church (and us today) to excel in the gracious act of giving generously, especially in times of need. The Corinthians were falling short! Paul says we should give generously and without complaint because *the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your*

sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich.

Jesus' generosity is the example we should be living by, and His generosity in saving us should motivate us to do what is right.

Livestreaming Holy Mass from Holy Name has become quite the draw. Our cathedral in Scranton shares our online Holy Masses with their parishioners. On Good Friday we had 800 viewers on Facebook for the Liturgy of the Presanctified. We had 763 for Holy Mass on Easter. Several hundred people spent time in quiet prayer and reflection on Holy Thursday and Good Friday. Prior to the crisis we typically had about 60 people who tuned-in, now it is about 160. To Jesus Through Mary



Did you know that I have a church bell sound on my iPhone? It rings every day at noon. Why? To remind me that church bells

ring in a special way at noon? Well yes, and to remind me that the special tolling of the bell is my call to pray the Angelus.

The Angelus is a devotion commemorating the Incarnation of Jesus. The devotion is the recitation of three verses and responses from the Bible and praying the Hail Mary in between.

During most seasons of the year the Angelus goes as follows:

Ÿ. The Angel of the LORD declared unto Mary

Ŕ. And she conceived of the Holy Ghost.

Hail Mary...

Ÿ. Behold the handmaid of the LORD.

Ŕ. Be it done unto me according to thy word.

Hail Mary...

Ÿ. And the Word was made flesh.

Ŕ. And dwelt among us.

Hail Mary...

Ÿ. Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God.

Ŕ. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

Amen.

During the Easter Season, these words are replaced by Queen of Heaven

Ÿ. Queen of heaven, rejoice, alleluia.

Ŕ. The Son you merited to bear, alleluia,

Ÿ. Has risen as he said, alleluia.

Ŕ. Pray to God for us, alleluia.

Ÿ. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary, alleluia.

Ŕ. For the Lord has truly risen, alleluia.

Let us pray: O God, who have been pleased to gladden the world by the Resurrection of your Son our Lord Jesus Christ, grant, we pray, that through his Mother, the Virgin Mary, we may receive the joys of everlasting life. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

In offering these prayers we bind ourselves closely with Mary asking that she intercede for us. Especially at this time we look to her as one of her great titles, Health of the sick/ Uzdrowienie chorych.

Solemnity of the Ascension

The church celebrates the Solemnity of the Ascension on the 40th day after Easter as is recorded in the Acts of the Apostles.

Why is this day important to us? It isn't only that Jesus is returning to His rightful place of honor in heaven. Rather it shows us that Jesus, who emptied Himself and came as a man, who lived, ate, laughed, cried, suffered, and died as a man, Whose human body was glorified in the resurrection also ascended in that glorified body into heaven. This is our assurance that we too will rise and live in heaven eternally with Him in our glorified bodies. The parish will broadcast Holy Mass on Thursday, May 21st at 7pm in celebration of the Solemnity.

We are honored to have received a beautiful monstrance from Holy Spirit parish in Little Falls, NY. We honor the legacy of that parish and its faithful.

The root word for monstrance means 'to show.' The monstrance offers us an opportunity to 'show' Jesus and our faith to the whole world.

As we sing, pray, and offer up our special needs during exposition we do not just show-off Jesus, rather in kneeling before Jesus' presence, we show the truth of faith - that Jesus is truly and fully present under the appearance of the consecrated eucharistic bread. We would not be foolish enough to kneel to bread alone! At benediction, we are blessed by Jesus Himself.

Bishop Joseph Padewski, Martyr



On Sunday, May 10th, we also commemorate the 69th anniversary of Bishop Joseph Padewski's martyrdom.

Bishop Padewski was born in a small farming village near Radom in Poland. He emigrated to the United States in 1913 and moved to Detroit. He was ordained to the priesthood of the PNCC on December 16, 1919 by Prime Bishop Francis Hodur.

In 1942 Bishop Padewski was arrested by the Nazis and was held at the Montelupich prison in Krakow. He was then transferred to the Tittmoning POW Camp in Germany where he was held for 18 months. Through the intervention of the Swiss Red Cross he was freed and returned to the United States in

March 1944. Between 1944 and 1946 Bishop Padewski served as pastor of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Czestochowa Church in Albany, New York.

Bishop Padewski returned to Poland on February 20, 1946 to resume his duties as Bishop of the Polish branch of the PNCC. Shortly after his return, in this atmosphere of Stalinist terror, he was arrested, interrogated, and tortured. Bishop Padewski died under torture on May 10, 1951. He is the only American civilian citizen ever killed by a communist government.

Bishop Padewski, martyr for the faith, pray for us.

When will the parish 'reopen?'

What does the future hold? Interestingly, we know as much about the future as we knew before this whole crisis started.

Many say that churches are closed. That is a misnomer. Church has not been, nor will it ever be, closed. Not only is the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass being offered for each of us regularly, we are the living church in each of our homes and in our community of family, friends, and neighbors.

Note that our parish will not reopen for public worship on a whim. When the time is right, when we can gather again safely, we will reopen. We will do so responsibly and with great care. We pledge to trust the words of scientists and health care professionals who are true heroes and experts in these matters. Decisions will be based on the health and safety of God's kingdom workers - all of us. We will not allow anyone to move us away from our responsibility.

Stay home, stay safe, and live the commandment of love: *Thou shall love the Lord thy God and thy neighbor.*

Public worship steps

While an exact time for restarting public worship has not been determined, we are taking steps to prepare in consultation with our bishop who has issued carefully considered guidance on the steps that must be taken.

Among the steps we have taken are

- the purchase of a large supply of face-masks,
- evaluating the cleaning process necessary prior to and between Holy Masses,
- the requirement for appropriate social distancing, and
- if necessary, additional Holy Masses will be added so that crowd density is lessened.
