BE ANXIOUS FOR NOTHING

This month's first Sunday is a Solemnity dedicated to the character and nature of God, Trinity Sunday. In reflecting during that Solemnity we focus on all that flows from the Father. We then follow our typical yearly cycle of also honoring our spiritual fathers (the clergy of our Church) and our human fathers.

St. Paul is writing to the Philippians. He starts in Chapter 4:6-7 by saying, Be anxious for nothing. Now we might say, good advice Paul, thanks, but you do not understand. After all, we have disease, civil unrest, the problem of generational prejudice, murder bees, plus a stadium sized asteroid making a close pass at earth. How can I not be anxious?

Paul is not writing in a vacuum. He is writing from prison after a harrowing journey to prison which included shipwrecks (p.s., no lifeboats back then). No joy or fun being in prison either. In other letters he expressed his despair at being abandoned by his friends, no one showed up for his trial, but he did not hold it against them.

Paul is also writing to a community

with its own issues. Remember that most people who followed Jesus were slaves (meaning laborers, minimum wage workers), women and children who society saw as inferior. They saw the hope of Jesus, a Son sent by the Father to offer Himself for them - for people otherwise considered worthless.

The Christians of Philippi faced the day-to-day degradations and prejudice foisted on them by society. They also faced infighting as happens in any family. You can more than imagine the anxiety of a family persecuted by society, on edge within itself, and whose leader was in prison far off. They felt everything about to collapse.

Paul's command, Be anxious for nothing is not an option. All of our undue cares intrude into an arena that belongs to God alone. Having undue care knocks God out of His Father role and makes us father instead of child. Let God be Father.

Paul goes on to tell us to pray to God, to ask, for there are no areas of our lives that are of no concern to God. Pray with confidence, thanksgiving, and receive peace.



Commitment to Dignity

As followers of Christ, and members of the Schenectady community, we commit ourselves to upholding the image of God in all persons. This comes from the gospel to which we are dedicated.

Consistent with our mission and the Gospel message, we commit ourselves to be formed into people who honor the image of God in all persons, who proclaim the Kingdom in our midst, and who actively oppose anything that degrades the dignity and worth of others.

The Christian mission of Holy Name of Jesus compels us to speak out as a community, and individually, when we see any act of injustice. We are charged by Christ with making sure all within our community know we reflect His image, walk in His way, and shine His light, advancing the peace of God in the world around us.

We know that words on their own can never be enough. At the same time:

- We state unequivocally and without reservation, on behalf of the entire
 Holy Name of Jesus family, that we condemn racism in all its forms. <u>It is a</u>
 <u>sin</u> and completely antithetical to the Gospel of Jesus Christ.
- We recognize the profound contributions that people of color have made to

the Schenectady community and to our nation and how that contribution has enriched our lives.

- We stand grieved at how slowly things have changed with regard to our country's racial divide and commit ourselves to being the change that is needed.
- We repudiate all racially inspired acts of violence, hurt, and malice.
- We affirm the image of God that our African-American community members bear and how they bear it.

As a parish and as a Church, we have a proud legacy of diversity and respect for anyone facing exclusion, prejudice, persecution, and violence. We ourselves have living memories of those sins committed against us back to our earliest years.

For nearly 100 years, we have benefited from all who stood to fight against prejudice and bigotry. We stand now and say NO MORE!

PRAYER FOR RACIAL JUSTICE: Let us pray. God our Creator, You are present in all Your sons and daughters. Forgive us when we allow hate, division, ignorance, and fear to separate and divide us, harming the unity for which Jesus prayed. Open our minds and hearts to see Your image in everyone. May we see each person as Your child who deserves to be treated with dignity and respect. Inspire in us creative and loving action as we work for racial justice. May we courageously answer your call to care for each and every one of our brothers and sisters. May we strive to listen, learn, and love as we act to build a more just society. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, Your Son, Who lives and reigns with You in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

A retired priest and his spouse receive a total of \$600 per month. They loose their housing and all the other benefits they had as active clergy and must venture out to live on that meager amount. They sacrificed their lives for their flock, they must sacrifice again? Should the priest die, the widow is left with \$300 a month. What a shame!



Desperately Pray for and Encourage Vocations

June is the month we devote to prayer for and encouragement of vocations. It is not hard to fathom the desperate situation the Church is in. If you and I do not pray now, and every day for vocations, who will? If we do not care enough to encourage our sons, grandsons, husbands, nephews, and cousins to the altar, who will?

Our choice is to pray and encourage or to just let it die. Are we willing to do that?

There are hard decisions to be made. We have to pick ourselves up by the bootstraps, gather courage, and set to rebuilding for if we do not, who will?

Reopening Plans

As of now, we are looking to reopen for public worship in the church building starting Sunday, July 19th with one Holy Mass and with certain required conditions. We will do so responsibly and with great care and only if the situation continues to improve!

It is vitally important that we act with self-restraint and wisdom. At a basic level, if you are not well, stay home. If you do not feel safe, stay home. Participate remotely. We will continue to broadcast Holy Mass as we have always done (long before the current crisis began). God wants you alive to do His work.

Requirements for reopening

- All pew missals, hymn books, and any other items must be removed from the pews. This prevents the passing of viruses via touch.
- There must be proper and more than adequate cleaning of all surfaces between Holy Masses/ services.
- There will be no singing, instrumental music only.
- Holy Communion will not be distributed.
- Masks must be worn and must cover the nose and mouth.
- The church doors will be propped open so people can enter/leave without touching surfaces.
- Any papers (the bulletin) must be taken home and may not be left behind. They will be placed in the pew in advance.
- Social distance must be maintained by all persons. Pew seating will be restricted.
- Upon entering the church, you must go to the front. You must sit from the front to the back. In other words, enter and go to the first unoccupied pew in the front. Do not start sitting from the back to the front. Do not walk past occupied pews when entering. This prevents people from passing each other and passing on viruses. We

hope to not have to 'usher' you.

- Upon leaving, do the reverse.
 People in back leave first. In other words, do not walk past occupied pews.
- There will be a central collection basket in the back. Place your donations and tithes there.
- There will be no social gatherings or coffee hours.

These precautions have been established by the Polish National Catholic Church for everyone's protection and well being.

We are a wonderful family and I have no doubt we can do this with proper safety precautions. We will ask some to step up and carry out necessary tasks. Please volunteer to help and continue to stay safe and well!
