December, Christmas, New Year's Eve. That's our secular calendar for December. Whether we get our calendar at the bank, the local liquor store, or online - we can find all those things. But if we happen to have picked up a Home Liturgical Calendar (there's still a few available), we find a bridge, the start of a new Church Year with the season of Advent.

Advent is about hope and expectation of a brighter future. In Advent we at once commemorate the waiting of the Jewish people for the promised Messiah and connect with our urgent expectation of His return. We are first and foremost called to look forward with hope.

Henryk Adam Aleksander Pius Sienkiewicz, the Nobel prize winning author, wrote his "Trilogy" of historical novels – set in the 17thcentury Polish–Lithuanian Commonwealth - in the late 19th century. In this series of books (and I recommend you get the translation by W. S. Kuniczak) he points to people looking to the sky in the midst of Poland's wars and sufferings, and declaring 'It must be the end.' Certainly they did. Yet the world did not end in the 17th or 19th centuries. Any among the people of that time expecting the end lost the opportunity to hope forward.

For us as Christians, the call is not to sit around contemplating the end, biting our nails and hoping we get to heaven, but to offer hope today, and thus to be heaven, the breaking open of the Kingdom of God, for our brothers and sisters.

We all long, that cannot be helped. We have all been challenged, and especially in this year. For us, Advent longing and the challenges of the time must not be met with dour, sad, and forlorn attitudes but rather with hope filled and bright faith looking forward.

Each Advent, let us look forward, not in a delusional way, but with ready faith. Let us look forward expectantly, with active faith. Let us never lose the opportunity to live and share hope. Grasp it so we may meet Jesus, the Hope of humanity.


In darkness, broken by candlelight, we watch as a woman approaches the stable to place the Holy Infant. We hear the great proclamation. Then we worship.


6th Anniversary - Ordination to the Holy Priesthood

New Liturgical Year



Readings from Scripture are part of every Holy Mass and hold a very special place of prominence

in our Holy Church - for through the

proclamation and teaching of the Word we receive sacramental grace.

The Sunday cycle of readings is divided into three years, labeled A, B, and C. A new cycle begins every First Sunday of Advent. Weekday readings fall into two cycles, cycle I and II. On November 30th we entered Year B and Cycle I. In Year B, we read mostly from the Gospel of St. Mark.

Advent Charitable Giving - food, clothing, ornaments

This Rorate Holy Mass is celebrated in the dark, just before sunrise, by candlelight only. We are continuing this tradition this Advent, starting Wednesday, December 2nd at 7:30am. The other dates are December 9th, 16th, and 23rd.

Annual dues were reduced



What do you think about Church dues? Do you think they are something priests and bishops impose? Do you think it is too much of a burden?

We set the dues: Dues are established at Holy Synod by our peers, our elected representatives. Dues are never imposed by the clergy. The people of the Church, in accordance with our democratic tradition, establish the dues necessary to keep the Church and diocese running and solvent.

What happens without dues?

The Church would go bankrupt and would dissolve. It could not operate at the most basic level.

Well, my parish will stay open, won't it? No! Without the Church and diocese there can be no parish. We would be without bishops, priests, and all the basics needed to carry on worship. We would no longer have a mandate nor legal authority to exist.

Well, it is soooo much! Not really. Dues amount to \$2.40 per week per member. Is the Church worth that much? Many fought and even faced prison for our Holy Church. Many also double or tripled mortgaged their homes for the purpose of building up the Church. They were courageous vanguards who were willing to sacrifice all for Jesus' Kingdom. Dues are part of giving generously from our plenty - those who first established dues gave that and more from their want.

The benefits of church membership, including burial in parish cemeteries, r<u>equires the payment of</u> <u>annual dues</u> which support the larger Church, our Diocese, and our Parish.

This year dues were reduced to \$125 per year for each adult member regardless of age.



Please pay your dues with joy and thank God that we have our Church. If anyone

faces such severe financial difficulties that \$2.40 per person per week is unaffordable, please see Fr. Jim privately.

On Holy Communion



How often should I receive Holy Communion?

Some may feel that they have not

attended Holy Mass unless they have received Communion. Some may feel that Holy Mass is not the same unless Holy Communion is offered to the faithful. This is a <u>recent phenomenon</u>.

Throughout history, the faithful only received Holy Communion a few times a year, but attended Holy Mass every week. The Eucharistic banquet cannot occur without the faithful present. As such, weekly attendance by able bodied_people is required under pain of serious sin. For ages, reception of Holy Communion only occurred at Christmas, Easter, or Pentecost. Communion was received after long preparation including prayer, confession, penance, and long fasting.

In the early 20th century the Roman Church began to promote more frequent reception of Holy Communion. They were right insofar as people were staying away from Communion for wrong reasons like feeling unworthy or out of fear.

At the same time, the promotion of frequent reception, as with the desecration of the Holy Eucharist in the allowance of of reception in the hand, turned more frequent reception into a cheap and often thoughtless action. "I went to mass, and I'm going to get my cookie and go home."

We believe frequent reception is good, but only with preparation, reverence, and dignity.

Our Church has given guidance to all its clergy on the distribution of Holy Communion at any time and now, in this time of pandemic.

- As is the norm in our Church -<u>Communion is never given in the</u> <u>hand</u>. If some priest or deacon is doing this they are <u>desecrating</u> the Eucharist. This is a <u>crime</u>!
- Communion may be given using specialized procedures, approved by the Bishops, in accord with CDC guidelines, to prevent the spread of the Coronavirus. Even using those procedures, the risk is elevated. Note the large number of priests dying from COVID.

Refraining from reception for now is indeed a sacrifice, but one we need to be together on in our communion as family. We ask your patience, and hope this explanation helps in understanding.
