WHOEVER SAYS HE ABIDES IN HIM OUGHT TO WALK IN THE SAME WAY IN WHICH HE WALKED.

Abide is a great word. It is a word with depth to it. We might think of similar words like remain or stay, but abide, that's deeper.

St. John writes about the meaning of abide in that deeper sense. It is not about just hanging out. Having invited folks to come over we might even invite them to stay or remain, but rarely do we ask people to abide with us - to stay forever

You see, stay and remain are time constrained words. Abide implies permanence, to persist, continue, and last. In abiding we go on without ending. To abide means we are in a stable and fixed state of relationship. In the phrase "abide in Me," (John 15:4) which is May 2nd's gospel, Jesus asks us, His followers, to stay constant in our relationship with Him, to live with Him in His gospel way forever.

To abide, to stay forever in relationship with Jesus, is at the heart of the Christian journey. Our abiding with Him means we are incorporated into His Body and that we have accepted the responsibility of living out the gospel walk.

We have received the gospel, God's very word. Receipt of the gospel means more than just having a bible on the shelf, for if we have come to Christ by faith and have given Him our lives, then He has invited us to abide - in all that word means and implies.

In this month of May, as Spring blooms about us, it is opportune to ask ourselves - where do I abide? Do I walk in Christ's gospel way?

Those who abide are changed outwardly and inwardly. The daily cares of the world continue, but impact us far less. In the Church of Hebrews and in Acts, people lost everything, homes, possessions, freedom - yet they counted it as nothing because they did not abide in the world. They knew where their home was, where the promise was. So they lived as citizens of heaven and as people freed from anything that might have constrained them, particularly the cares of the world.

Let us who abide in Jesus then walk His way, free in His promise forever.

Did you know that church bells ring in a special way at noon? The noon Angelus bell is rung to remind us of our call to pray the Angelus.

The Angelus is a devotion commemorating the Incarnation of Jesus. The devotion is the recitation of three verses and responses from the Bible and praying the Hail Mary in between.

During most seasons of the year the Angelus goes as follows:

v. The Angel of the LORD declared unto Mary

**R**. And she conceived of the Holy Ghost.

Hail Mary...

v. Behold the handmaid of the LORD.

 $\mathbf{\tilde{R}}$ . Be it done unto me according to thy word.

Hail Mary...

*ŷ.* And the Word was made flesh.

R. And dwelt among us.

Hail Mary...

v. Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God.

 $\mathbf{\hat{R}}$ . That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

Amen.

During the Easter Season, these words are replaced by Queen of Heaven

§. Queen of heaven, rejoice, alleluia.

**R**. The Son you merited to bear, alleluia,

*℣. Has risen as he said, alleluia. ℟. Pray to God for us, alleluia.*

*§. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary, alleluia.* 

**R**. For the Lord has truly risen, alleluia.

Let us pray: O God, who have been pleased to gladden the world by the Resurrection of your Son our Lord Jesus Christ, grant, we pray, that through his Mother, the Virgin Mary, we may receive the joys of everlasting life. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

In offering these prayers we bind ourselves closely with Mary asking that she intercede for us.

## Solemnity of the Ascension

The Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Ascension on the 40th day after Easter as is recorded in the Acts of the Apostles. Jesus' Ascension is our assurance



that we too will rise and live in heaven eternally with Him in our glorified bodies. Holy Mass will be held on Thursday, May 13th at 7pm in celebration of the Solemnity.



#### May 2021 Discipleship Example - Bl. Joseph Padewski



During the month of May, we focus on Bishop Padewski a martyr of our Holy Church. We remember him and all those who have lost their life for their faith in

our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

**Holy Scriptures**: 1 Peter 4:12-19; Luke 9:23-26

#### **Reflection and Action Item:**

Bishop Joseph Padewski was consecrated a bishop in 1936. His efforts not only rebuilt the PNCC diocese of Poland, but fostered its growth. This growth was abruptly halted with the Nazi invasion of Poland, which began World War Two. During this period the missionary diocese in Poland once again saw the destruction of its churches and the imprisonment, torture and murder of its clergy. Fully three-fourths of the diocese was destroyed. Padewski was himself imprisoned and tortured. He was later released as an American prisoner of war, for a German general officer. He was sent back to

America where he once again assumed the role of a parish pastor.

Following WWII, Bishop Padewski returned to Poland and worked to rebuild our diocese in Poland. He gained legal status for the church in 1946. A little while later, in the midst of his efforts, the communist government undertook active persecution of the Christian Church. Bishop Padewski was taken by the authorities, imprisoned, tortured and ultimately murdered. The oral account of his death was given church authorities by a cleaning woman who witnessed the torture Bishop Padewski endured. He died on May 10, 1951. At the age of 57, he became the first bishop-martyr of the Polish National Catholic Church. He was buried in Warsaw, Poland.

Almighty God, this month we remember the life of the first martyred bishop of the Polish National Catholic Church, Joseph Padewski. He dedicated himself to the building up and restoring of our Catholic Church for the people of Poland. May the example of his life and death inspire us to share the same message to people of all nations, proclaiming Your Gospel and so extending Your kingdom here on earth.

Offer a Prayer for Bishop Padewski and all Martyrs who have given their life for the faith. Support a person who is being persecuted for living out their faith either with your time, talent or treasure.
