In our Holy Church, we dedicate the month of June to prayer for Sacred Vocations. This prayer, commanded by Jesus in Matthew 9:38, is a necessary part of every Christian's routine of prayer and I call on you to act, to take up this cause in your personal prayer life.

In this cause of prayer, there are two requests. This first request is for the general gift of vocations, that many will be called. The second request is for responsiveness on the part of those called.

The Church has always been in need of men to step up and into the role of Deacon and Ministerial Priest. It is no secret that the Holy Spirit has inspired many to accept these roles, yet few respond. As the Church's National Vocations Director, I see the depth of our need for men to be called and for those called to listen, step forward, and take up the role God wants them in.

We could engage in a ton of calculating as to why the called do not respond. I have heard all the alleged causes: economic and

sociological. It is odd that the two greatest reasons are never really discussed: a lack of prayer and lack of faith.

It is not lost on us that just prior to the month of June we celebrated Trinity Sunday focused on the mystery of the Holy Trinity, then on the first Sunday in June the celebration of Corpus Christi focused on the mystery of the Holy Eucharist. Being a Christian requires faith in these things. We believe those things by faith. So this is a test, will those called live fully faithfully? Will we proceed in faithfilled prayer as Jesus asked? Will those called respond in faith as the Holy Spirit asks? Will we trust God?


The Letter to the Hebrews, Chapter 11 puts it very well in its first verse: "If people believe God, then they know they have the things they hope to get. It is the proof of things we do not see." God does answer.

Let us then buoy up our faith. Believe in God and pray each day this month and the rest of the year for vocations. See what happens.

A retired priest and his spouse receive a total of \$600 per month. They loose their housing and all the other benefits they had as active clergy and must venture out to live on that meager amount. They sacrificed their lives for their flock, must they sacrifice again? Should the priest die, the widow is left with \$300 a month. What a shame!

Our Holy Church sets the month of June aside and encourages the faithful to pray for the clergy of our Holy Church and for an increase of vocations. That prayer starts in family, both by words of prayer and the prayer of encouragement. Families are the seed of vocations and our work is so needed.

June 2021 Discipleship Example - Ruth and Naomi



During June on our Discipleship 2021 journey we focus on Ruth and Naomi.

Holy Scriptures: The Book of Ruth.

Reflection and Action Item: The story of Ruth and Naomi speaks to our hearts of the great dignity of family life and the call to be faithful to one another, come what may. This month reach out to a member of your own family with whom you have been out of touch for a while. Make that call you've been putting off for some reason or send a card with a note to catch them up on family happenings. This is a great chance for all of us to emulate the faithfulness of Ruth and Naomi!

100th Anniversary Mistory



This year we celebrate the 100th Anniversary of our parish's founding in Schenectady.

Our parish was an active and vital part of local, national, and international efforts during and immediately after World War II.

In the post-war period our pastor, Fr. Senior Joseph L. Zawistowski was very active in assisting in the recovery of Poland. He and Bishop Padewski (later martyred by communist authorities in Poland) sailed from New York in February 1946 for an assessment of the situation on the ground in Poland. They returned some five months later. Fr. Senior Zawistowski went on a speaking tour to tell about the conditions he observed in Poland.

Other leading figures that went about the same time were the president of the Polish Women's Alliance (PWA) and a Polish general. Each was highly criticized in Polish-American circles for describing the terrible conditions that existed in Poland and for saying that the Soviet Army was going to remain in Poland for a long time. So-called Pol-Am leaders were demanding an uprising in Poland thinking it would throw the Red Army out of Poland, a ridiculously impossible feat. In Detroit, Pol-Am organizations hung Fr. Senior Zawistowski in effigy for his talks and articles; but some 1,500 people came to hear him. The PWA president lost her position. Others in the group were hounded for providing the same truthful information.

Even so, Fr. Senior Zawistowski's efforts and speeches raised significant aid money for Poland. It was the largest amount ever raised in the Church until the million dollar effort in the 1970s for the new Spojnia Home for the Aged in Waymart.

In our neighboring parish, Good Shepherd, Rev. Bołesław Sikorski was himself a survivor of the horrors of the war. Fr. Sikorski was the nephew of Prime Bishop Leon Grochowski. He was born in Warsaw, Poland and graduated from Seminary in 1937. In 1939 he resigned his pastoral duties and enlisted as a Private in the Polish Army. He received a battlefield promotion to Lieutenant. He was later captured and held in both Russian and German concentration camps. He came to the United States in 1959. He served Good Shepherd from 1964 till his death in 1975.

In 1956, Rev. Roman P. Jasinski, a former chaplain of the Polish Army and member of the Polish Underground came to pastor Holy Name of Jesus.

Fr. Jasinski was active in the Polish Underground just after Germany invaded Poland. He was able to escape Poland before his arrest by the Gestapo, arriving in France where he enlisted in the Polish Army and was assigned Chaplain to the Second Polish Division in Brittany. He was captured at Dunkirk and interred as a POW. He escaped, made his way to Spain, where he was captured again, and this time placed in a concentration camp. He escaped once again, making his way to England. He arrived in the United States in 1943.

Immediately after his assignment as pastor, Fr. Jasinski and parishioners engaged in sponsoring the resettlement of Polish Refugees in Schenectady. On February 14, 1957, Fr. Jasinski and parish delegates Mr. Frank Wilk, Mr. Henry Banasiak,

Mrs. William Trier and Mrs. Ferdinand Ruchalski welcomed four refugees and one other person to Schenectady. They were: Mr. and Mrs. Tadeusz Wisniewski, Zygmund Rutecki, and Mr. and Mrs. Tadeusz Wołoszyn.
