e might say that 2021 has been the "Year of Delivery Woes." The mail, shipping issues, misdirected packages, oops, we had to change the delivery date are all things we heard. They may have caused us some frustration.

Did you know that there is one area of delivery that has worked perfectly? No, it is not a matchup between FedEx, UPS, USPS, and DHL - it is the assured delivery of God's promises.

Look at the verse from 2 Corinthians 1:20 above. It says that ALL THE PROMISES OF GOD have their YES in Jesus. Jesus is indeed the delivery fulfiller.

Throughout human history God made promises. He would deliver His people from sin and death. He would bring peace and healing. He would turn people's stoney/hard personalities into heart centered personalities - they would be people of love. He would show His people the way to true joy - a joy that overcomes circumstances, a joy that is more than momentary happiness.

Rorate Holy Mass is celebrated in the dark, just before sunrise, by candlelight only. We are continuing this tradition this Advent, starting Wednesday, December 1st at 7:30am. The other dates are December 8th, 15th, and 22nd.

On Sunday, December 12th we will have only one Holy Mass at 10am followed by a sing-along and our Vigil/Wigilia Dinner along with an Ornament Exchange.

New Liturgical Year



Readings from Scripture are part of every Holy Mass and hold a very special place of prominence in our Holy Church for through the proclamation and teaching of the Word we receive sacramental grace.

The Sunday cycle of readings is divided into three years, labeled A, B, and C. A new cycle begins every First Sunday of Advent. Weekday readings fall into two cycles, cycle I and II. On November 28th we entered Year C and Cycle II. In Year C, we read mostly from the Gospel of St. Luke.

What do you think about Church dues? Do you think they are something priests and bishops impose? Do you think it is too much of a burden?

We set the dues: Dues are established at Holy Synod by our peers, our elected representatives. Dues are never imposed by the clergy. The people of the Church, in accordance with our democratic tradition and constitution, establish the dues.

What happens without dues?

The Church would go bankrupt and would dissolve. It could not operate at the most basic level.

Well, my parish will stay open, won't it? No! Without the Church and diocese there can be no parish. We would no longer have a mandate nor legal authority to exist.

Well, it is soooo much! Not really. Dues amount to \$2.40 per week per member. Is the Church worth that much? Dues are part of giving generously from what we have.

The benefits of church membership, including the privilege of burial in parish cemeteries.

Dues are \$125 per year for each adult member regardless of age.

Please pay your dues with joy and thank God that we have our Church. If anyone faces such severe financial difficulties that \$2.40 per person per week is unaffordable, please see Fr. Jim privately.

How Does God Measure Generosity?

"'I am the Lord's servant,' Mary answered. 'May your word to me be fulfilled'" (Luke 1:38).

I've taught a lot about generosity, and how it's a way to become more intimate with God.

Remember the story of the widow and what the Bible described as her "two mites," or small coins in Luke 21:1-4?

The rich folks' donations weren't a sacrifice. They weren't putting themselves in danger of hardship. Did that mean they didn't love God? Not necessarily. But the widow's act required faith. She loved a God she believed would take care of her, and she wanted to show her love by giving back to Him.

That's the point of generosity. God measures generosity not by the size of the gift but by the size of the sacrifice. He doesn't need our money. He owns everything. But generosity is a way for intimacy with Him to increase. The only way that intimacy happens with God is this mechanism called faith. Not knowledge. Not "good works." Faith.

When we believe what God says to the point of trusting Him with all we have, we will begin to truly understand who He is and how much He loves us.

So what does that have to with the Christmas story? Think of the characters in the narrative. Each step of each person, all the way to Jesus and God the Father, is a snapshot of what the Bible teaches about God's generous heart.

First, the shepherds. In biblical society they're at the bottom of the rung. Uneducated and often stinky, shepherds had nothing to give. But when the heavens were full of angels testifying to Christ's birth they leave work and skedaddle to Nazareth. They spread the word that the Messiah has come. All they have is time.

Who else is in the story? Joseph, of course. What did this young blue-collar worker give? His reputation. He married his pregnant fiancée, in a culture that stoned adulterers.

And Mary? What did she give? In addition to her body, Mary gave her future. Here was a teenaged girl, probably dreaming of a home and family with Joseph. From the moment the angel Gabriel announces to her that she's chosen and will give birth to the Son of God, the life she pictured is over.

And of course, God the Father gave His beloved Son. And His beloved Son, Jesus, gave His life.

So what is the measure of generosity? To sacrificially worship God in faith with what we have. And what is the gain of generosity? What do we get out of being generous? To know Christ more deeply and become like Him.

Remember, God by the Holy Spirit wants to do things in us and through us beyond our wildest imagination. But if He doesn't have our whole heart, He can't start to guide us until we trust Him.

Will we let God do with our lives what He wants? That will be the measure of our generosity.
