SO WE DO NOT LOSE HEART. THOUGH OUR OUTER SELF IS WASTING AWAY, OUR INNER SELF IS BEING [REMODELED] DAY BY DAY.

Have you ever remodeled your home? Maybe you have rebuilt a car or truck? Maybe you changed the way things are done at work - improved them. In any event, consider what is involved in a remodel or re-do.

My wife and I are in the process of updating our home. We watched HGTV and saw lots of nice things we might like to do. Finally we pulled the trigger and embarked on the remodel.

Oh my... Well, it is nothing like HGTV. It will not happen in a weekend or in a sixty-minute episode. At each turn there is something unexpected, something one might consider frustrating. That, and the cost, the necessary investment.

You like that vanity and sink - it will be eight to twelve weeks. We got the bathroom tile in, but now need to shave down your door. The moulding is disintegrating - you will need new moulding. It goes on.

Here we are in Lent. Here we are in this season of spiritual remodeling. Some parts of us may need a major redo, other parts, just a nice touch of paint. Nonetheless, we all need a remodel, a re-do in some measure.

As we enter Lent we might view it like an episode of the other HGTV - Holy Grace TV. We think we can get it done quickly, but then reality sets in. It takes grace and work.

Some of what we undertake is going to take time. Some of what we attack is going to require far more. Perhaps we need to bring in a consultant (a spiritual director, Holy Scripture, a good and proper Christian study book...).

As with any work we need to do, we must begin by taking account of what we are willing to invest. Our investment: What things we can sacrifice to make more time for our Lenten re-do (prayer, charity, holy reading, sacrifice, diligence).

Once we set to work we must fully expect the frustrations that will come along the way. It will not be easy, but wait till you see the result!

Let us then enter our Lenten re-do, our internal renewal without delay.

Our Lenten Journey Toward Holy Week



We begin our Lenten journey on March 2nd, Ash Wednesday, with Holy Mass at Noon and 7pm. Each Friday we gather to observe the

sacred tradition of Stations of the Cross at 3pm. Every Sunday we gather for Bitter Lamentations / Gorzkie żale at 3pm. These observances help us better understand the loving devotion Jesus had for us. Walk with Him in these devotions so that we may rejoice with Him at Easter.

Lent is time devoted to repentance, a turning away from the ways, events, and situations that are harmful to us.

Let us live Lent mindfully with prayer (Sunday and daily Holy Mass, Stations, Lamentations, private prayer, bible reading, our Seniorate Lenten retreat on April 2nd), sacrifice (fasting - no meat on Wednesdays and Fridays), penance (recollection of and turning away from sinful behaviors), and charity (Lenten giving).

We ask you to participate in our annual directed giving campaign (see below) as an act of charity and almsgiving to offer up food and other things needful for those in our local community.

Passiontide begins April 3rd and Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday on April 10th.

Please be attentive to our schedule and join us. There is truly no greater experience than the deep contemplation and sacrifice that leads us to the ultimate joy of Easter.

Year of Discipleship -March Focus



March 2022 – Importance of the Holy Eucharist

Scripture: John 6:51-58; Mark 14:12-16, 22-26

Reflection and Action Item: In the PNCC the moment of receiving Holy Communion is sacred and holy. Our practice is that only those men ordained to Holy Orders may distribute the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ. Their hands are consecrated as are the Chalice, Paten and Intinctorium used during Holy Mass. Following the words of consecration, the priest keeps his thumb and index finger together as he has touched the divine. Communion is administered with reverence under both species – the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ are received by the

faithful. A beautiful and precious moment. Let us reflect this month on just what this moment means by recalling some of our catechism questions.

362) Why does Christ give us His Body and Blood in the Holy Eucharist?

Christ gives us His Body and Blood in the Holy Eucharist:

- 1. To unite us with Himself in Holy Communion.
- 2. To remain ever on our altars, as a proof of His abiding love for us.
- 3. To unite us with our heavenly Father.

364) What is Mass?

Mass is the Sacrifice of the New Testament, in which bread and wine is consecrated into the Mystical Body and Blood to God through the ministry of a priest, for a perpetual commemoration of Christ's Sacrifice upon the Cross, offered once and for all time.

365) When was the Sacrifice of Mass instituted?

The Sacrifice of Mass was instituted at the Last Supper, when Jesus commanded His Apostles to do what He had done, that is, to change bread and wine into His Body and Blood. And having taken bread, He gave thanks and broke, and gave it to them, saying: "This is My Body, which is being given for you; do this in remembrance of Me." In like manner He took also the cup after supper, saying: "This cup is the New Testament in My Blood, which shall be shed for you." (Lk 22:19-20)

366) What is the place of Mass in the Polish National Catholic Church?

In the Polish National Catholic Church Mass is the central point of worship and life, in perfect continuity with the teaching of the Apostles and practice of the primitive church. The Sacrifice of Christ upon the Cross is the supreme act of love. "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that, whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." (Jn 15:13)

When we take part in the Mass, we are called upon to offer ourselves with Christ to God, through our own acts of faith, love and sacrifice. "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends." (Jn 15:13)

376) Why do we offer the Sacrifice of the Mass?

We offer the Sacrifice of the Mass:

- 1. To adore God.
- 2. To thank Him for all the benefits He bestows upon us.
- 3. To ask His blessing.
- 4. To obtain His mercy for the living and the dead.
- 5. To apply the merits gained on Calvary to the Church in general, and to individual souls, in particular.

390) Why does Jesus Christ come to you in Holy Communion?

Jesus Christ comes to me in Holy Communion so that He may:

- 1. Unite me with Himself.
- 2. Strengthen me in the practice of good works.
- 3. Strengthen the divine life which I first received in baptism.


