FOR YOU HAVE BEEN A STRONGHOLD TO THE POOR, A STRONGHOLD TO THE NEEDY IN HIS DISTRESS, A SHELTER FROM THE STORM AND A SHADE

hrough much of Advent we read from the Prophet Isaiah. In those readings we often hear a reference to the poor and how God will save the poor. Later in the Christmas season we will hear Jesus quote Isaiah 61:1 when He gets up to proclaim the Word and teach in the Synagogue: The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me to bring good news to the poor.

We might think to ourselves, well isn't Jesus just great with the poor! Think of how He helps them and causes us to exert our charity in helping the poor. He lays out all this stuff about us doing for the least of these, thus doing it for Him. That work for the poor helps us get to heaven. The Church, in the model of Jesus, filled with the Holy Spirit, established the Corporal Works of Mercy focused on the poor.

What we tend to miss in all this discussion of the poor is the fact that Jesus did not specifically come to address the economically poor. Remember, He told us: For you always have the poor with you.

(Matthew 26:11). If He did not come to address the economically poor, then who did He come to help?

The answer is simple enough, Me. Jesus came and gave His all for me. I started in a place that was very poor - my humanity - and Jesus took on my poorness, entered into my poverty - to raise me and many on high, up to the very heaven He came from. He sacrificed His life to make me rich, a co-heir with Him to all His Heavenly Father has.

As we walk through Advent and finally gaze on the representation of Jesus in the poverty of the stable, let us remember where we were before we came to faith in Jesus and how very rich we are now. Then let us act!

Certainly, to act means to care for the economically poor as required of us by the gospel of Jesus, but also beyond that to lift up those who are what we were, poor without Christ Jesus. Let us use this new Church Year to invite them into the Kingdom, to share in the treasure we have, to be rich with us.

Rorate Holy Mass

What is a Rorate Holy Mass? It is a custom from antiquity to celebrate a



special votive Holy Mass, typically on Wednesday's in Advent, in honor of the Blessed Virgin. This Rorate Holy Mass is celebrated in the dark, just before sunrise, by candlelight only. We are continuing this tradition this Advent, starting Wednesday, November 30th at 7:30am. The other dates are December 7th, 14th, and 21st.

8th Anniversary - Ordination to the Holy Priesthood


I was ordained to the Holy Priesthood eight years ago on December 6th (the Commemoration of St. Nicholas).

New Liturgical Year

The Sunday cycle of readings is divided into three years, labeled A, B, and C. A new cycle begins every First Sunday of Advent. Weekday readings fall into two cycles, cycle I and II. On November 27th we entered Year A and Cycle I. In Year A, we read mostly from the Gospel of St. Matthew.

Annual dues

What do you think about Church dues? Do you think they are something priests and bishops impose? Do you think it is too much of a burden?

We set the dues: Dues are established at Holy Synod by our peers, our elected representatives. Dues are never imposed by the clergy. The people of the Church, in accordance with our democratic tradition and constitution, establish the dues.

What happens without dues?

The Church would go bankrupt and would dissolve. It could not operate at the most basic level.

Well, my parish will stay open, won't it? No! Without the Church and diocese there can be no parish. We would no longer have a mandate nor legal authority to exist.

Well, it is soooo much! Not really. Dues amount to \$2.40 per week per member. Is the Church worth that much? Dues are part of giving generously from what we have.

The benefits of church membership, including the privilege of burial in parish cemeteries.

Dues are \$125 per year for each adult member regardless of age.

Please pay your dues with joy and thank God that we have our Church. If anyone faces such severe financial difficulties that \$2.40 per person per week is unaffordable, please see Fr. Jim privately.

December 2022 – The Eucharist: The Heart and Center of Who We Are



During the month of December as we conclude our year of Being Eucharistic People – we

reflect on importance of receiving our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ in the Most Holy Eucharist to lead and guide us on our earthly pilgrimage.

Scripture: (Ezekiel 36:26-27) A new heart I will give you, and a new spirit I will put within you; and I will remove from your body the heart of stone and give you a heart of flesh. I will put my spirit within you and make you follow my statutes.

Reflection: As we have now begun to open up our parish churches following the most difficult parts of the pandemic, I had the opportunity to distribute Holy Communion to a number of individuals who had not received our blessed Lord in Holy Communion for some time. I remember seeing the tears of joy in their eyes as they approached the altar to receive Jesus and how moved they were to be united, at that moment, with our Lord. These individuals were aware that up until that time they were missing something precious and holy within their lives.

It is so very easy for each of us to lose track of exactly what are the most important things in life. First and foremost of these things must be the worship of God in the Holy Eucharist and the reception of His Son in Holy Communion. When we do not participate in this central point in our lives or when we do not attend to it the way we should, we begin, in fact, to have "stony hearts.' God desires that we come to Him in worship and in love; He desires that we are united to Him in the reception of Holy Communion. He seeks to put within us "hearts of flesh," hearts renewed under His continuing creative power and love.

In order for us to be faithful Catholics, true and faithful followers of Jesus Christ, our worship and participation at the Holy Eucharist is essential. It is our worship of the God Who created us, our union with the Lord Who loves us and gave Himself for us upon the Cross. It is the opportunity to join with others into the one body of Christ on earth to accomplish His work and build the kingdom of God. It is truly the heart and center of who we are and all that we are, as individuals and as parishes together. In fact, it is the heart and center of all creation.

Action Item – After the reception of Holy Communion at your parish church, pray the Prayers of Thanksgiving after Communion from the PNCC Prayer Book and contemplate the great gift you have received as Christ comes to you in Holy Communion.
