was listening to religious radio the other Sunday, just after Thanksgiving, and the commentator mentioned that we are now in the Christmas Season. Now, I am not a Negative Nelly, correcting everyone for such mistakes. I am happy that they recognize the need to celebrate the season. The better question, Why the rush?

If you are old enough you might remember the days when the decorations were put up on Christmas Eve or in the week before Christmas. Folks prepared for Christmas by living with a sense of anticipation.

Anticipation - the old ketchup commercials where they sang Anticipation while the ketchup slowly trickled out of the bottle. Anticipation like in the heart of a child awaiting Christmas morning, a bride her wedding, parents the birth of a child. Those and many other occasions we each know very well.

We Catholics know something of anticipation. In every Holy Mass we await the living presence of the Lord

Jesus and our receiving Him in Holy Communion. We live seasonally anticipating the celebration of the key moments in our Lord's life which encompass our salvation history. It does not all happen right away.

Advent calls us to a spirit of anticipation. The Holy Church guides us through this season focusing on our Lord's coming and echoing Psalm 130: *I wait for the Lord, my soul waits, and in his word I hope*.

Let us imagine our keeping of this time of anticipation. What awaits us? A grand celebration of forty days beginning Christmas Day and lasting until February 2nd. We will together celebrate those moments of salvation history that focus on family, the impoverished that first met Jesus, and His revelation to the nations. On the other hand we can meet Christmas exhausted, throw out the tree the next day, and miss all Jesus revealed to us.

So, let us celebrate by keeping this time of anticipation for if we do the peace of Christ will indeed reign in our hearts.

Rorate Holy Mass

What is a Rorate Holy Mass? It is a custom from antiquity to celebrate a special votive Holy Mass, typically on Wednesday's in Advent, in honor of the Blessed Virgin. This Rorate Holy Mass is celebrated in the dark, just before sunrise, by candlelight only. We are continuing this tradition this Advent, starting Wednesday, December 6th at 7:30am. The other dates are December 6th, 13th, and 20th.

Our Vigil / Wigila Dinner

On Sunday, December 10th we will have only one Holy Mass at 10am followed by a sing-along and our Vigil/Wigilia Dinner along with an Ornament Exchange.

The dinner is absolutely **free**. Fish is provided by the parish. If you are able, please bring a meatless dish to share.

Organ Blessing and Charity Concert

On Sunday, December 3rd at 4pm our Prime Bishop will join us to bless our "new" organ and for a charity concert to support the arson fire recovery efforts at Blessed Virgin Mary Parish.

On Monday, May 15, 2023 an arson fire destroyed a storage garage and burned the siding, portions of the roof, and a brand-new storage refrigerator at the parish (www.bvmc.org) in Latham.

The suspected arsonist, Mark Marcus, was subsequently arrested. Albany's ABC News 10 reported:

One fire nearly burned down a church.

"In this one instance we had the fire [spread] to a church nearby which caused extensive damage. It could have been far worse," said Colonie Police Lieutenant Daniel Belles.

The Blessed Virgin Mary Parish suffered the worst damage.
Colonie Fire Services, Senior Fire Protection Specialist, Ben Stevens says the fire was dangerous for firefighters.

In an official statement to police just after he was arrested Monday morning, 25-year-old Mark Marcus admitted to setting the fires and called himself an arsonist. "When I see something, I want to light on fire I use my lighter to light it."

We come to the stable in humility, hearts filled with expectant hope. This



New Liturgical Year



Readings from Scripture are part of every Holy Mass and hold a very special place of prominence in our Holy Church – for through the proclamation and teaching of the Word we receive sacramental grace.

The Sunday cycle of readings is divided into three years, labeled A, B, and C. A new cycle begins every First Sunday of Advent. Weekday readings fall into two cycles, cycle I and II. On December 3rd we entered Year B and Cycle II. In Year B, we read mostly from the Gospel of St. Mark.

Annual dues

What do you think about Church dues? Do you think they are something priests and bishops impose? Do you think it is too much of a burden?

We set the dues:

Dues are established at Holy Synod by our peers, our elected representatives. Dues are never imposed by the clergy. The people of the Church, in accordance with our democratic tradition and constitution, establish the dues.

What happens without dues?

The Church would go bankrupt and would dissolve. It could not operate at the most basic level.

Well, my parish will stay open, won't it? No! Without the Church and diocese there can be no parish. We would no longer have a mandate nor legal authority to exist.

Well, it is soooo much! Not really. Dues amount to \$2.40 per week per member. Is the Church worth that much? Dues are part of giving generously from what we have.

The benefits of church membership, including the privilege of burial in parish cemeteries.

Dues are \$125 per year for each adult member regardless of age.

Please ensure your dues are paid before December 31st. Pay them with joy and thank God that we have our Church. If anyone faces such severe financial difficulties that \$2.40 per person per week is unaffordable, please see Fr. Jim privately.


