- When we fall in sin, we are welcomed back (see the Parable of the Prodigal Son - Luke 15:11-32, the way the Shepherd searches after His lost sheep - Luke 15:3-7, or the woman caught in adultery -John 7:53-8:11).
- When we are weary we are provided for as Elijah was provided

food and water prior to his journey (1 Kings 19:5-18).

• The Psalms reflect David's experience of refreshment in the midst of his trials - *The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures. He leads me beside still waters. He restores my soul.*

This month it behoves us to focus on how we might refresh others. Remember that God's promises are contingent on our own generosity and refreshment of others.

We have opportunities in the parish - of which many partake: the Daily Bread Food Pantry, CarePortal, the School of Christian Living, our outreach at events like the upcoming Pierogi 5k in Schenectady's Central Park, getting together to cook some food, or the simple welcome we offer to newcomers.

Because of who we are and Who He is, God continually renews us. As we enter church each Sunday, let us be aware of God's refreshing provision flowing over us and continue in our work of refreshing others.

We live in a world that pulls us in a hundred directions simultaneously. Families take different forms. Families struggle to find time to share together. We barely eat together, watch the same television programs, or even worship together. We have lost touch with the concept of a day of rest - a day on which we used to reconnect as family and community.

On the Solemnity of the Christian Family, October 13th, we offer our prayers to God for our families. And since these are prayers for the Christian Family, not only our individual families, we pray that all families make time for Christ and His Holy Church.

Please join together for worship on this special Solemnity and extend an invitation to members of your family.

October = Polish American Heritage Month



Polish American Heritage Month is celebrated in October by Polish American communities throughout the United States. It was first celebrated in 1981 at the Polish American Cultural Center in Philadelphia.

Originally it was celebrated in August at various gatherings, travel events, and culturally-significant locations in Pennsylvania. The Polish American Cultural Center and the Polish American Congress lobbied politicians at the state and national level to make August the month for Polish heritage.

In 1984, House Joint Resolution 577 passed, making August Polish American Heritage Month. President Ronald Reagan urged all Americans to join in the celebration honoring Polish heritage in the United States. The month was changed to October in 1986 to aid participating schools in teaching about Polish-American contributions and heritage. October also holds significance as the month when the first Polish settlers came to Jamestown, Virginia in 1608.

Month of All Souls



As October passes the days grow shorter, the colors of autumn take hold, and our thoughts turn to the Commemoration of All Souls. The Holy Church sets aside the month of November to commemorate those who have preceded us in holy death.

We will remember our dearly departed during the month of November according to age old Catholic custom of commemoration and prayer...a custom known as "wypominki."

If you would like the souls of loved ones to be remembered during the Commemoration of All Souls and at every Holy Mass throughout November, please send the names of these loved ones to Fr. We will celebrate the Solemnity of All Saints on Friday, November 1st with Holy Mass at Noon and on the Observation of All Souls on Saturday, November 2nd with Holy Mass at Noon along with the reading of the names of all the faithful departed.

ON BEING NOT PERFECT

Thank you to Paul for sharing this.

I used to be perfect. When I was born, my mother told me that I was perfect. She would not lie to me. But somehow I lost it and now I am not perfect.

Major religions, such as Judaism and Christianity, call upon their adherents to periodically conduct an examination of conscience, both in personal solitude and in the company of others. In Greek philosophy there is a postulate that "An unexamined life is not worth living." This is particularly apt when one's life, or the life of one's community, has gone awry.

None of us is perfect and our lack of perfection all too often becomes obvious. We may then feel shame, anger, remorse, unworthy, stupid, diminished, a failure, foolish, defeated, destitute and other emotions. Or perhaps resentful, dismissive, contemptuous, revengeful, hateful towards those around us for their failures, betrayals, nastiness, goofiness, carelessness, self-centeredness, obliviousness, or sheer stupidity.

If we stop at this point, we remain in a negative, often hopeless, defeated state.

An examination of conscience is not only

to review, count, repeat and dwell on all that has gone wrong within and around us but also to look toward what can be undone, restored, improved. Condemning ourselves and others is not the final stage, it is to find a better way to live, to restore self-respect and build a more wholesome community. To live with hope again, an imperfect person among imperfect people.

Did You Know That You Must



As Polish National Catholics we are to make an examination of

conscience before Holy Mass begins. That prepares us for the Sacrament of Penance received at every Holy Mass.

We teach young children that they must do this before Confession so that their Confession may be worthy. In the same way, as adults, we are to approach God with a certain seriousness and sorrow over our sins if we expect Him to grant us forgiveness. If we go into our Confession without the requisite seriousness what should we expect then in return?

To that end, the Church has included a useful Guide to an Examination of Conscience in our Pew Missals (see pages 1 through 6). There are 23 sections in this Examination. Some may not apply to everyone. Even if we took only 10-15 seconds per prayer, section, and reflection, it would take about six minutes in total to do this. Is being free worth six minutes?
