#### BELOVED, WE ARE GOD'S CHILDREN NOW

n All Saints Day he heard the line above taken from the First Letter of St. John (1 John 3:1-3). What a wonderful statement of assurance for us who are His faithful people.

A primary emphasis for us on the road to sainthood is understanding the type of relationship we have with God. Our relationship is naturally centered on God's love toward us, and His desire for a familial relationship with us.

This relationship needs to be built up - which takes time - and relies on our growing into the image of Jesus. St. John is telling us that the more we resemble Jesus, the more the Father loves us as His sons and daughters.

We know the saints did their utmost to resemble Jesus. Perhaps they did not accomplish that in every way, but each saint took his or her talents and worked to grow those talents into a reflection of how Jesus showed forth that aspect of Himself.

Those talents may have been compassion, community building, charity, care, gentleness, discipline, teaching, feeding, holding people

accountable for their behavior, and in so many other ways.

The natural consequence of our growth into Jesus' image, and using our talents to reflect Him in our world today, is the gift of hope for eternal life and eventual glorification alongside Jesus. St. John tells us that we shall be like Him.

We know God loves us and wants relationship with us. We know we are called to respond to His love with a commitment to grow into the image of Jesus and by using our talents to reflect Him in our own unique ways. Our promised outcome is living in hope for eternal life and glory.

Becoming a saint is this process of knowing, growing, and living - but it always starts in one place - that is desire.

Desire for God is not something we can manufacture. Rather, it is a call within ourselves, prompted by the Holy Spirit, to love God abundantly and to move toward Him with an overwhelming yearning to be His saint. Drawn to Him, let us continually grow in desire for God and to reflect Him in every way.

#### We Shall Overcome



"We Shall Overcome" is a gospel hymn that is very closely related to the civil rights movement in the United States.

The song may have descended from "I'll Overcome Some Day," a hymn by Rev. Charles Albert Tindley. Its imagery was taken from Galatians 6:9: "And let us not be weary in doing good, for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not."

The more modern version was first said to have been sung by tobacco workers led by Lucille Simmons during the 1945–1946 Charleston Cigar Factory labor strike.

In 1947, the song was published under the title "We Will Overcome" in an edition of the People's Songs Bulletin by Zilphia Horton, thenmusic director of the Highlander
Folk School of Monteagle, Tennessee
—an adult education school that
trained union organizers. She taught
it to many others, including People's
Songs director Pete Seeger, who
included it in his repertoire, as did
many other activist singers, such as
Frank Hamilton and Joe Glazer.

In 1959, the song began to be associated with the civil rights movement as a protest song - part of nonviolent civil rights activism.

The song has been also recorded by choirs, symphony orchestras, and other famous folksingers like Joan Baez.

A key victory from the civil rights movement was the Voting Rights Act of 1965. This legislation prohibits racial discrimination in voting and enforces protection granted under the Fourteenth and Fifteenth Amendments to the United States Constitution.

Our right to vote is important as is our obligation to participate in our democratic form of government. Indeed, our very Church models much of its Constitution, By-Laws, and Rule of Faith on each member's right to a voice and a vote.

Let us then exercise our right to vote and let us also be circumspect concerning outcomes. Remember that this mortal life is just that (as we especially recall during this Month of All Souls) and that our true home is in heaven. Let us carry ourselves to the polls and afterward as Christians heading for heaven -

with love, kindness, and thoughtful and gentle words toward all.

#### Rorate Holy Mass -Wednesdays in Advent



What is a Rorate Holy Mass? It is a custom from antiquity to celebrate a

special votive Holy Mass, typically on Wednesday's in Advent, in honor of the Blessed Virgin. This Rorate Holy Mass is celebrated in the dark, just before sunrise, by candlelight only. We are continuing this tradition this Advent, starting Wednesday, December 4th at 7:30am. The other dates are December 11th and 18th. No noon Holy Mass will be celebrated those days.

#### Thanksgiving Hymns

There are so many wonderful Thanksgiving Hymns. Hopefully this November we can sing them all whether here at church, in our cars, or at home.

Among the well known hymns are:

- Praise to the Lord the Almighty,
- Now Thank We All Our God,
- We Gather Together,
- Great Is Thy Faithfulness,
- For the Beauty of the Earth, and
- Come, Ye Thankful People, Come.

"Come, Ye Thankful People, Come" was written by Henry Alford and first appeared in Psalms and Hymns in 1844.

Henry Alford was born October 7, 1810 in Bedford Square, London, England. He soon lost his mother and was raised by his father, an Anglican clergyman. The family had given five consecutive generations of Anglican clergymen.

In his Bible at the age of 16, Alford wrote, "I do this day in the presence of God and my own soul renew my covenant with God and solemnly determine henceforth to become His and to do His work as far as in me lies." Alford was ordained in 1833.

Alford's talents in music, scholarship, poetry, and writing were abundant. He translated many Greek texts and wrote extensively on methods for biblical study and understanding. His methods led to great changes in the way biblical texts are analyzed and studied.

Alford died in 1871 at the age of 60. The inscription on his tomb, chosen by himself, is *Diversorium Viatoris Hierosolymam Proficiscentis* ('the

lodging place of a traveller on his way to Jerusalem').

- 1. Come, ye thankful people, come, Raise the song of harvest home! All is safely gathered in, Ere the winter storms begin; God, our Maker, doth provide For our wants to be supplied; Come to God's own temple, come; Raise the song of harvest home!
- 2. We ourselves are God's own field, Fruit unto his praise to yield; Wheat and tares together sown Unto joy or sorrow grown; First the blade and then the ear, Then the full corn shall appear; Grant, O harvest Lord, that we Wholesome grain and pure may be.
- 3. For the Lord our God shall come, And shall take the harvest home; From His field shall in that day All offences purge away, Giving angels charge at last In the fire the tares to cast; But the fruitful ears to store In the garner evermore.
- 4. Then, thou Church triumphant come,
  Raise the song of harvest home!

All be safely gathered in,
Free from sorrow, free from sin,
There, forever purified,
In God's garner to abide;
Come, ten thousand angels, come,
Raise the glorious harvest home!
